CHARLOTTE CUSHMAN.

It was announced by telegraph from Boston Friday morning that Miss Charlotte Cushman, the gifted and renowned actress and true artist in her profession, had just died in that city. For some months past she had been disabled by a painful and usually fatal ailment, and had been more or less a sufferer from it for five or six years—always resisting its progress and holding resolutely to the hope that she might be cured. The intellectual side of Miss Cushman's character was, in our judgment, the strongest, clearest and most versatile she has possessed in any actress since the days of the Kembles. Both her acting and her "reading," especially in recent years, have been rare and rare intellectual studies, delightful as exhibitions of dramatic and elocutionary art, and in the highest degree valuable as instruction. She had remarkable analytic power in divining the true meaning of her author's far the time being, and whether that meaning was expressed in plain terms or in subtle and occult phrases, she had the other and complementary power of giving full and accurate expression to that meaning by tone and inflection and modulation of voice with appropriate action, so that the most delicate lights and shades of color (so to speak) of an author's meaning were made almost visible as well as audible to her hearers. These were the results—first, of the preponderance of the intellectual side of her nature, and then of her close and conscientious study and training, her student labors growing instead of lagging as she matured in years. Her talents covered the whole histrionic range from broad comedy to the highest dignity of the tragic muse. She was master of the whole field, between—humor exquisite as the fragrance of a flower; to the heart, blinding tremor to the lip and moisture to the eye grotesque and picturesque characterization—and finally a dramatic energy that startled the spectator with its vehement declamation and its electric power. Miss Cushman was as prime a favorite in society of the stage as she was popular upon it—full of interesting conversation, liberal, charitable, hospitable, refined—an honor to her profession and a just source of pride to her sex.
