The governor has signed the following bills, information of which has been officially transmitted to the senate and house

House bill No. 14, an act supplementary to the act entitled an act sup-plementary to the several acts relating to the state treasurer and commissioners of the sinking fund, approved May 9, 1874. Signed February 12.

House bill No. 4, an act to enable assignees, for the benefit of creditors,

to make sales of real estate encumbered by liens. Signed February 17. House bill No. 19, an act supplementary to an act to prescribe the manner by which the courts may divide boroughs into wards, approved May 14, 1874. Signed F-bruary 17.

House bill No. 48, an act supplemen-tary to an act to provide for the incorporation and regulation of certain corporations, approved April 29, 1874, au-thorizing bridge companies to exercise their corporate franchises within less than 3,000 feet of any other bridge in

nactual use, to cross streams bounding cities of the third class from any polet within the same. Signed March 14.

House bill No. 24, an act in relation to the entry of satisfaction of judgments which have been fully paid by the defendant. the defendant. Signed March 14. Senate bill No. 13, a supplement to

an act to authorize the governor to appoint additional notaries public, Signed March 16. Senate bill No. 8, a further supplement to an act to provide for the admission of certain classes of the insane into hospitals for the insane in this com-

monwealth and their discharge there-from, approved April 20, A. D. 1869. igned March 28.
