-Commenting upon the platform adopted by the Republican party at the Cincinnati Convention, last week, the Baltimore Gazette says : "We have glittering generalities about the men who fought the rebellion, but the main portion of it is given over to the Negro and the Chinaman. To-day thousands and thousands of white men are starying. Their families are without bread. Factories are idle ; mills are running on half time. No word is said of these starving men and their starving wives and children in the platform. Instead, we have appeals to dead and bygone issues; to the late war; to the school question; to the right of a man to kneel at the altar he deems proper. The old war issues are revived, and at the end of eleven years we are asked again to go into hostile array and fight over a struggle which was long ago settled. This is the policy of the Republican party ; this is its platform. Is the country in this centennial year ready and willing to keep open these elements of discord, which were long ago settied by the arbitrament of battle ? Shall this go on forever? Shall we never know peace ? Shall we never be again a unlted people-united against every foreign foe, standing together for one country

and one flag ?" -A "Centennial Congress of Liberals" is to be convened at Concert Hall, Philadelphia, July 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th, for the purpose of organizing a National Liberal League-about fifty local Liberal Leagues having been alrealy organized during the past three or four years in different parts of the country. The general object of these Leagues is to accomplish the total separation of Church and State, by repealing all laws which exempt church property from taxation, permit Bible reading and worship in the public schools, enforce a Sabbutarian observance of Sunday and so forth. Over \$1,700 have been paid in to defray the expenses of this convention, and more than five hundred certificates of membership have been already issued. Francis E. Abbot, editor of the Boston Index, is the chairman of the committee of arrangements, and should be immediately addressed (enclosing stamp for reply) pt No. 1 Tremont Place, Boston, by all who wish to become members of the Congress. Numerous distinguished citizens have given to this movement the sauction of their names, which will be made known on organizing the new National League. A large attendance is expected, and a vigorous agitation in favor of strictly secular government, State and National, will be undoubtedly initiated. Addresses will be made by James Parton, B. F. Underwood, Charles F. Paige, Mrs. Carrie Burnham Kilgore, Francis E. Abbot, and others; and important practical measpres will be proposed for deliberation and action.
