The public debt statement for March shows a decrease of \$14,107,016. The largeness of the reduction arises from the cancellation and destruction of \$9,433,899 of the balance of the 5 per cent. bonds of 1851, held in trust for the payment of the awards made by the Commissioners of the Alabama Claims.

The Directors of the State Bank of Harrisburg, at a meeting on Friday, resolved to go into liquidation; the cashier to immediately pay 20 per cent. of all claims against the bank as they mature, and the balance of said claims as soon as the bank can realize a sufficient sum from its assets. The President and cashier read a circular on Saturday morning, stating that the action of the Directors has been induced mainly by the unprofitableness of the banking business. They report the assets of the bank at \$202,585 and its liabilities at \$163,049.

The National Convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, which has been in session in New York city, adjourned since Monday evening. According to the new Constitution the headquarters will be in New York city. Active measures are to be taken for the extension of the order. The rule is to be stringently enforced that no person shall become a member who is not Irish or Irish descent, a Roman Catholic and of Roman Catholic parents. In regard to the relations between the Hibernians and the Catholic Church, it was not deemed necessary to take any decided action. By the new laws any Hibernians who shall be found guilty of participating in any of the crimes of the Molly Maguires in the Pennsylvania coal regions, will be expelled from the order. The Hibernians indignantly deny any connection, either directly or indirectly with the Molly Maguires or any other mischievous and malicious organization.

At a Cabinet meeting on Monday it was voted to issue an order withdrawing the troops from the State House of South Carolina. By this action says a Washington dispatch of that date to the New York Sun, "Gov. Hampton wins everything. He enters the State House as Governor. He brings a Democratic Senate, a Democratic House, a Democratic Judiciary. He sends to Congress a Democratic Senator and four Democratic Representatives, out of five members in the lower House. At the close of the Cabinet meeting a formal note was sent to both Chamberlain and Hampton announcing the determination of the Cabinet. Chamberlain expressed the hope that no action would be taken during his absence, and he was told in reply that he could rest assured that the situation would remain unchanged until both he and Hampton returned to Columbia. Hampton expressed a somewhat similar hope, being anxious to be on the ground when his Government took formal control of the State House. Chamberlain accepts the result as a crushing defeat. He was asked if he proposed any resistance, and responded, "It would be hopeless." He has hitherto mapped out a plan of passive resistance, making necessary a forcible ouster. Now he appears to have abandoned this plan, and talks of letting the responsibility rest where the order was issued. Here in Washington he and the rest talk of the action taken by the President as the end of the Republican party in South Carolina. The King which has run and ruined the party is gathered in Chamberlain's room to-night—Chamberlain, Patterson, Bowen, and the rest—a gloomy party, a very gloomy party. Hampton returns satisfied. In conversation he said that the decision gave the Democrats both branches of the Legislature, as what has been known as the Legislature now becomes the legal State body; and Butler, he went on to say, would in all human probability become Senator. No persecutions would be allowed, he said but investigations would begin and suits be prosecuted against all.

The official orders for the withdrawal of the troops from the State House in Columbia, S. C., were issued Tuesday. The withdrawal is to take place on Tuesday, the 10th instant, at noon.

The commission appointed to select a site for a new insane asylum for eastern Pennsylvania had a meeting on Saturday, and chose the farm of Rudolphus Kent, near Gwynedd, in Montgomery county, on the North Pennsylvania railroad. The farm contains about 200 acres, and the price is \$175 per acre. The choice was made by ballot, six of the commissioners voting in favor of the Kent farm, two for the Hittman farm, near Norristown, and two for the Wellington Hickman farm, near West Chester.
