-Hon C, A. Mayer, ot Clinton county, the able and popular judge of the Twenty-fifty Judicial District, is prominently mentioned in connection with the Democratic nomination for Supreme Judge. Judge Mayer is known to the bar and bench of the state as a learned jurist and an upright man

-The Democrats of Greene county have instructed their delegates to the State Convention to support Auditor General Temple for State Treasurer. The Philadelphia Chronicle of Saturday publishes an editorial endorsing the choice of the Greene county Democrats.

-- According to an Associated Press telegram from Washingtan, gentlemen of both parties arriving from New Orleans, are enthusiastic over the results of the recent pacification. Republicans are credited with saying that the colored people are treated better than ever, and Governor Nicholls and his party have thus far shown themselves sincere in their efforts to promote the interests of all, regardless of race or politics.

-G. W. & C. B. Colton & Co., 172 William St., N. Y., have prepared a very complete and handsome Map of the Seat of War-or rather two mups on one sheet - 29 x 18 inches, showing Turkey in Europe and Turkey in Asia, with portions of the countries adjoining, the whole of the Black Sea, and the eastern portion of the Mediterranean Sea, which they sell for thirty cents. A copy of this Map will aid materially in getting a clear understanding of the newspapes reports relating to the Eastern complications.

-A decision in the suit of Ann Eliza against Brigh am Young was rendered by Judge Schaeffer, in Salt Lake City, last Friday. 'The Judge decides that the plaintiff is not entitled to a decree of divorce, the alleged marriage being polygamous, and therefore null and void; also, that, "during the time plaintiff was with defendant as polygamous wife, she was serving him as a menial servant, and would be entitled to reasonable compensation for her service, but, having received in this instance, in the form of alimony pendente lite, more than such services are shown by the proof to be reasonably worth, she should go hence without further compensation."

-William G. Brownlow, the once famous "Parson Brownlow," died at his residence in Knoxville, Tenn., Sunday afternoon, in the 72nd year of his age. He was a native of Virginia. At the age of 21 he entered the Methodist ministry and labored for ten years as an itinerant preacher. Politics soon attracted him, and in 1837 he became editor of the Knoxville Whig, and his command of epithets and very vigorous mode of expression caused him to be know as the "fighting parson." When the secession movement commenced he advocated the preservation of the Union as the best safe-guard for the institutions of the South. He was arrested for treason against the Confedracy in December, 1861, and in March, 1863, sent within the Union lines. He then delivered lectures and speeches in the Northern cities, and published a book on Secession. In 1864 he returned to Tennessee, and next year became Governor of the State, and in 1869 he was elected to the Senate of the United States. Since the close of his term as States Senator he has taken comparatively little part in public affairs.
