-The Atterney General of New York, being unable to make any use of the alleged confession of Tweed, has returned the papers to the ex-Boss, and declined to release him from jall.

-The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have authorized the financial agent of this State to call in \$8,324,900 of the five and six per cent, loans due August 1st, to be paid on presentation at the Farmers' and Mechanics' National Bank, in Philadelphia.

-During April, 7853 immigrants, of whom 2800 were females, arrived at the port of New York. 2184 came from Germany, 1546 from England and Wales, 1364 from Ireland, 791 from Scotland, 350 from Italy,286 from Austria, 241, from France, 183 from Switzerland, 171 from Denmark, and the remainder from 22 other countries.

-The jury in the case of Bott, a Philadelphia preacher involved in an ugly scandal, disagreed on Saturday, one juror refusing to join the others in a verdict of guilty. Subsequently he was arrested on the charge that he had stated that it mattered not what the evidence was he would not convict Bott. A. H. Hodgson, the juror, was held in \$1,500 bail.

-The President and Mr. Hayes, accompanied by Secretary Schurz, Attorney General Devens and Postmaster General Key, went to New York Monday. The President returned to Washington on Thursday. The President attended the annual banquet of the New York Chamber of Commerce, Monday evening, and made a few remarks of a hopeful character regarding the political and business prospects of the country.

-We learn from New York that, at a meeting there Tuesday of Representatives of the several coal carrying companles, it was unanimously resolved, on a resolution offered by Mr. Sloan and seconded by Mr. Hoyt, that all the coal companies should suspend mining for the month of June or July, after which the meeting adjourned to await Mr. Gowen's approval by cable telegram. This is a very important step in the coal trade, the effect of which can scarcely be foreseen, if carried out.

-The Shenango Valley News says; "In 1875 the iron product in the Shenango Valley was 137,025, and the product of the Mahoning Valley 115,993 tons, total 253,018 tons.
