No reductions in wages are probable. The miners between Mahanoy City and Shenandoah, numbering 1200 men and boys, who struck a short time ago in apprehension of a reduction, have resumed.

Letter from Illinois.

DEAR EDITOR :- It gives me pleasure to inform you that we have enjoyed good health since our arrival in this State. Your paper comes to us regularly every Tuesday noon. It does not have time to enjoy many minutes of rest from its long journey in the postoffice before it is brought home and its contents eagerly read, and then not destroyed or used for other purposes, as is often the case, but is quietly laid away by the side of its brothers for future reference. It has brought us good news many times, but also, on few occasions, and news Some tale-hearer circulated a report that we were very tired of the west, wishing we were back again in the east. There is not a word of truth in the report. We like it bet-ter than we expected we would. I sup-pose in a few years we shall have lost all desire of returning except on a visit. Your readers would no doubt like to hear semething about our crops. I am sorry that I must say that every crop, with the exception of potatoes, will be a failure without a doubt. Wheat at the best will be but one half a crop. the best will be but one half a crop. We had a very wet spring; the oldest eltizen cannot recollect a similar one. On former occasions farmers often sowed their oats in the last week of Eebruary or the first week in March; this year some finished sowing the first week in May. Some is so short that it can hardly be gathered. On the 4th of May it commenced to rain and con-

tinued to be wet till the 14th. More corn was planted in June than in May. Many were obliged to replant. Since it was planted it has been very wet, causing the weeds to grow rapidly, and we are unable to destroy them. If this state of weather should continue much longer, the last two crops will be an entire failure. Potato bugs have not made their appearance. It is supposed the excessive rains have drowned them in the earth. Early potatoes will be plenty. Last year peaches were so plenty that all could not be used, while this year we have none.
