

Lynch Law—Its Origin.
James Lynch was mayor of Galway, Ireland, in 1473. He had made several voyages to Spain, and on one occasion brought home with him the son of a respectable Spanish merchant, named Gomez. Walter Lynch, the only son of the mayor of Galway, was engaged to a beautiful young lady of good family and fortune. Preparatory to the nuptials the mayor gave a splendid entertainment, at which young Lynch fancied his intended bride viewed his Spanish friend with too much regard. He accused his beloved Agnes of unfaithfulness to him, and she, irritated at his injustice, disdained to deny the charge, and they parted in anger. On the following night, while Walter Lynch slowly passed the residence of Agnes, he observed young Gomez to leave the house, he having been invited by her father to spend the evening with him. In the madness of his jealousy Lynch rushed on his unsuspecting friend who fled to a solitary quarter of the town near the shore. Lynch maintained the pursuit till his victim had nearly reached the water's edge, when he overtook him, and stabbed him to the heart, and threw the body into the sea, which cast it back again on the shore, where it was found and recognized the next morning. The wretched murderer surrendered himself; and his father, being chief magistrate of the town, entrusted with the power of life and death, found himself obliged to condemn his son to death. On the night preceding his execution, his mother went to the heads of her family and prevailed on them to attempt a rescue. The morning of the execution an immense crowd had assembled, who cried loudly for mercy to the culprit. The mayor exhorted them to submit to the laws; but, finding them determined on a rescue, he, by a desperate victory, overcame parental feelings, and finding that his efforts to accomplish the ends of justice in the usual place, and by the usual hands, were fruitless, he became executioner himself, and from the window of his own house, launched his unfortunate son into eternity.

PARAGRAPHIC.
—Berks county farmers are going extensively into the wool growing business.
—It is stated that shops of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad are to be built at Pottsville.
—Not more than 15,000 cases of the tobacco crop of 1877 remain in store in Lancaster city and county.
—The farmers of York county are raising saffron, an herb they sell to the drug trade at remunerative prices.
—White-glass sand, of excellent quality and in great abundance, has been discovered in the White Deer Mountains, near Milton, Pa.
—A cave has been discovered near Wytheville, Va., which is said to rival the Mammoth Cave of Kentucky in extent and beauty.

—Hawk shooting forms quite a business in Custer county, Colorado. Sixty cents per head is paid by the County Treasurer. One man brought in sixty a few days ago.
—A popular clergyman in England recently gave a lecture on "Fools." The tickets of admission were inscribed, "Lecture on Fools. Admit one." There was a large audience.
—A young man at a rifle match in Portland, Oregon, when his turn came at the target, shot a bystander through the heart. The killing may have been accidental, but there is doubt on the subject.
—In the high life below stairs of England there is a great deal of betting. Some years ago one of Lord Zetland's Joannesses killed himself on account of turf losses, and lately the butler of a London banker has performed a similar act on account of losses on "the Canbridgehire."

—An action was tried in the Court of Common Pleas in London, the other day in which Dr. Kenally, of Tichborne fame, was sued by Mr. Coote for \$655 for service rendered as solicitor. His defence was that the services were tendered gratuitously, and that Dr. Kenally had promised to send Coote business in exchange for services. This agreement Dr. Kenally swore he had fully complied with. The jury, however, brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for the full amount.
—The winter season of Texas usually lasts from the first of December to the middle of February, and its most distinguishing feature is the "norther," a periodical wind totally unknown in other States. They occur on an average twice a week and last a couple of days. They are preceded by a warm, close, summerish atmosphere, and during their continuance the temperature not infrequently touches 17°. The cold is the severest imaginable, not steady, as in the North, but of a keen, searching, biting description.

—Professor Hitchcock, the Anherst College Geologist, is now engaged in securing some of the celebrated fossil bird-tracks of the Connecticut Valley from a spot which has never before been worked for that purpose, the shore of Wethersfield Cove, about three miles below Hartford, Conn. The stone in which the tracks appear is of the same kind as that obtained from the Portland quarries, twelve miles farther down the river, and famous as the Portland or Connecticut freestone.
