

**PARAGRAPHIC.**  
—Wheeler, W. Va., is to have a "Mother Goose Social."  
—"Pronouncing matches" have superseded spelling matches.  
—There are 400 Artesian wells in San Bernardino valley, California.  
—Arrangements are being made in Baltimore for a grand baby show.  
—Four of the music teachers practicing their profession in Pittsburgh are blind.  
—The total number of pensioners on the books of the Pension Office, at Washington, is 232,164.  
—A child at Berlin, Ont., the other evening, was choked to death by a marble which it had playfully put in its mouth.  
—During the recent freshet on the Susquehanna nearly 275 rafts containing 12,000,000 feet of lumber reached the Lock Haven boom.  
—New Hampshire is to have a new State Prison, which is about to be erected at West Concord. The cost of the structure will be about \$200,000.  
—Boston's oldest inhabitant died on Sunday. Her name was Margaret Mahoney, and her age, as returned to the City Register's office, was 169 years.  
—The Duke of Norfolk, who was lately married to Lady Flora Hastings, gave his bride a pearl necklace once owned and worn by Queen Mary of Scotland.  
—A number of oil wells are being sunk at Emporium and other places in that vicinity along the line of Philadelphia and Erie, and Philadelphia, New York and Buffalo railroads.  
—Athorp, the Boston critic, says that a great pianist, even if he only helps his pupils by occasional hints, does more for their technique alone than the most persistent finger drudge.  
—The returns from the savings banks of Massachusetts for the year show a large decrease in deposits, roughly estimated at three to four millions. This is the first time in ten years that there has been a falling off.  
—Since Blondin began his tight-rope performances, in 1858, he has made more than 3000 ascensions, the average height of the cord being something less than 100 feet, and the distance thus perilously traveled not far from 2500 miles.  
—During the extra session of Congress, just closed, there were presented in the House 1603 petitions. Of this number 1203 were of a private nature, 93 for an increase of the salaries of letter carriers, 69 for the establishment of post routes, 40 relating to currency and taxation, 18 relating to the bankrupt law, and 20 of a miscellaneous character.  
—Two Harrisburg (Pa.) servant girls, who, in the absence of the family, went to bed Saturday night, after blowing out the gas, were discovered inauspicious on Monday morning, and were restored after a while to consciousness. Their escape from death is attributed to the fact that there was a pipe-hole in the ceiling and an opening at the floor near the door.  
—A party of a dozen boys who were out skating near Lykens, Pa., the other day, visited an old powder mill near by, and filled their pockets with powder which they there found. They then built a fire, put a large quantity of powder in an old dish and threw it in the flames. The result was an explosion which seriously burned four of the lads and inflicted slight injuries upon the others.  
—A special despatch from Chicago announces that the Illinois Central Railway has established a freight route between Chicago and New Orleans, and has entered into an arrangement with the New Orleans and Liverpool Steamship Company, whereby it will issue through bills of lading to Liverpool, and will be enabled to ship grain from Chicago to Europe at 70 cents per 100 pounds, the same as now charged by the Eastern trunk lines between the same points.  
—Sir Astley Cooper was visiting Paris, and was asked by the surgeon-in-chief of the empire, how many times he had performed a certain wonderful feat of surgery. He replied that he had performed the operation thirteen times. "Ah, but monsieur, I have done him 100 times?" "How many times did you save his life?" continued the curious Frenchman, after he had looked into the blank amazement of Sir Astley's face. "I," said the Englishman, "saved eleven out of thirteen. How many did you save out of 100 times?" "Ah, monsieur, I lose them all; but the operation was very brilliant!"  
—It is announced from Fort Walsh, Cyprus Hills, in Canada, that hostilities are likely to break out between the Sioux Indians, led by Sitting Bull, and the Blackfeet, a powerful tribe of treaty Indians, living in the British Territory. These latter claim the sole right to hunt buffalo in the region between the Rocky Mountains, on the west, and the Wood Mountains on the east, and complain bitterly that Sioux, belonging to Sitting Bull's band, have trespassed on their hunting ground. They threaten to shoot future trespassers, and Sitting Bull, presenting this conduct on their part, threatens reprisals, claiming to have as good a right as the Blackfeet to take Buffalo wherever he can find them. The English officers at Fort McLeod and Fort Walsh are endeavoring to appease the two bands of savages and to prevent warfare.  
—Concerning the Tammany Ring thefts, Mr. Wheeler H. Peckham, who is counsel for the city and county of New York in their suits against the plunderers, speaks as follows: "The amount of money actually recovered by the suits to the city so far is something over \$1,000,000, namely, about \$200,000 from Wabson, \$150,000 from Woodward, and \$400,000 from Sweeney. Besides this, we have obtained judgment against Tweed for \$5,500,000; he confessed judgment in another suit for \$1,500,000. The Corporation Attorney informs me that he is about to confess judgment in another suit of over \$7,000,000, and then I know of another suit, brought by the county, in which the items for claims, other than those included in the people's suit, amount to between \$5,000,000 and \$4,000,000, in which he will also allow judgment to be taken, or, in all, between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000. The amount sued for from each member of the Ring is the total amount stolen by his co-conspirators, and of which he had his share. As to the total amount of the Ring's stealings, I suppose that not less than \$20,000,000 was taken from the people from 1867 to 1871."

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
