

—Payment of the coupon due April 1 on the consolidated first mortgage bonds of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey is advertised by the receiver. This will be the first payment of interest on those bonds since 1876.

—Democratic State Conventions will be held as follows: Virginia, March 21, Virginia, May 19; Louisiana, April 1; South Carolina, June 2; Mississippi, April 1; Arkansas, June 2; Wisconsin, May 15; Indiana, June 9; New Jersey, May 10; Kentucky, June 11.

—The value of the merchandise imported at New York for the week ending last Saturday, was \$11,724,181, being \$1,493,264 in excess of the amount for the same week of 1879, and \$1,493,264 more than in 1878. The total value of importations at this port this year now amounts to \$105,133,411, or \$40,213,831 more than in 1879, and \$41,825,671 more than in 1878; while the total value of exports is \$62,453,947, or \$12,679,597 less than in 1879.

—The Comptroller of the Currency has received statements from all of the national banks except one in Oregon and one in Washington Territory, showing their condition on Feb. 21, 1880. The banks at that time had \$86,447,970 of specie, and gold certificates, \$5,941,513 in silver coin, and \$299,340 in silver certificates. The amount of specie held by the banks has more than doubled since Jan. 1, 1879. The amount of silver and silver certificates is about \$1,000,000 less than at the previous date. There has been an increase in specie since the date of their last report—Dec. 12, 1879—of nearly \$10,000,000, and an increase in silver certificates of about \$200,000.

—The Greenback State Convention met Tuesday in Harrisburg, Francis W. Hughes was chosen permanent Chairman. F. P. Devereux, of Schuylkill county, was nominated for Justice of the Supreme Court, and A. S. Roberts, of Centre county, for Auditor General. The selection of Electors at Large was referred to the State Committee. Resolutions were adopted declaring that all money should be issued by the Government, and banks of issue abolished; expressing sympathy for the working men of California; declaring that eight hours should constitute a day's labor; favoring "prostitution to soldier and a protective tariff; and protesting against the parading of the Riot Bill before Congress.

—As Gen. Winfield S. Hancock is prominently mentioned by leading Democrats as the probable nominee for the Presidency by that party, we may state that Gen. Winfield Scott Hancock was born in Montgomery county, Pennsylvania, in 1824, and graduated at West Point in 1844. He was brevetted first lieutenant for gallant conduct in the Mexican war, subsequently saw much service in the West, and at the breaking out of the rebellion held the position of quartermaster. He was appointed brigadier-general of volunteers in September, 1861, commanded a brigade in the Peninsula campaign, and was highly commended for his conduct at the battle of Williamsburg, May 31st, 1862. After the battle of Antietam, he assumed command of a division in the Second Corps, and distinguished himself at Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, and Gettysburg. At the last named battle he held command of the Second Corps, and was severely wounded. He participated in the campaign of 1864 against Richmond, and organized the assault which led to the capture of Johnson's division, May 12th. In the latter part of the year he resigned the command of the Second Corps to Gen. Humphreys, and was assigned to the First Corps, then reorganized. At the close of the war he commanded the 1st Massachusetts Cavalry, retiring from the service as major-general of volunteers. Speaking of the capture of Johnson's Corps on the 12th of May, 1863, Thos. P. Kettell in his history of the Great Rebellion, says: "On Thursday, the 12th, Hancock's Corps occupying a position exposed to the enemy's guns, moved cautiously as seen up to the enemy's lines, and a dense fog. Barlow's Division—Noble's Brigade followed—formed a column by battalions, took the advance, while Birney, Mead, and Gibbon, in two lines of battalions, supported the attack. The storming column advanced silently, and without firing a shot, up to the breastworks, over which it rushed, taking the flags within its grasp, and surrounding them, capturing nearly the entire division of Johnson, three thousand men, with his commander and also a brigade or two of other troops, Brigadier-General George H. Stuart in command. Over fifty pieces of artillery were also captured. The point of the lines thus carried was at Ewell's right and A. P. Hill's left, and the captured division was part of Stonewall Jackson's famous old corps. It was an exceedingly important point, Hancock being thus secured like a wedge between the enemy's right and left.

—A Cincinnati correspondent writing to the N. Y. Sun, says: "It shall be the standard-bearer of the Democracy, and the people against this unpalatable extension upon liberty, the integrity of the States, the Constitution and the republic of the fathers," and then proceeds to answer his own question thusly: "Three years he has the Democracy offered civilian statements as candidates, each being a citizen of New York. With him for a leader the ambitious throng of the third tier aspirants, that if Grant thinks himself elected he will take his seat, will have no terrors. Grant would never attempt to carry a third term. Hancock has been rightfully and fairly elected. With his name inscribed on our banners the Democracy would go forth to battle with new courage, new inspiration and faith, unswerving by the memory of his great services in the war would silence forever the voice of 'rebel brigades,' then whom none has ever better come to remember the Second Army Corps and its gallant commander, The Lion, the Lionhearted, the Hills, the McGraws, but best testimony to the vigorousness he holds in the cause of the Union.

—The price of paper has been advanced from six and one-half to ten cents all over the country. If this price is maintained, the public will be compelled to pay more for their newspapers. Many daily papers have already increased their price from twenty cents to thirty cents per week, and weekly papers from \$1.50 to \$2.00.
