A writer in the London Journal give me interesting statements respecting the fond. In the matter of feeding he says the toad is not very particular, either as to quality or quantity. Anything that creeps ed crawls will do for him-wood lice, beetles, piders, slugs, worms, even snails with their hells, are put out of sight as if by magic for he has a peculiar way of catching his prey. He watches the moving insect for an nstant or two; then suddenly darting out is tongue while at a distance of one or two nches, the insect is snatched up and swalowed instantly. One evening he gave one wasp and a bumble bee. Both were snatched up directly they commenced to move, apparently without caunng the toad the slightest discomfort, though they must have reached his stomach in a tolerably active condition. In plant houses especially forcing houses, where insects increase their umbers so rapidly at all seasons, the toad's services are especially valuable; and if a suitable ladder, made of a narrow board with bits of lath tacked on it two inches apart, be set in a corner, slanting from the floor to the stage, he will climb it, and thus be enabled to make himself still more useful. ng able to find toads in February, he, later n when they became plentiful, buried three in a nine-inch pot, with a slate on the top, eighteen inches under the ground, that he might have them handy for the next early forcing season. But that season he did not equire them, so they remained buried until the following one, and were then, on be-68 ing taken up, apparently not much the worse for their eighteen months' fast though they didn't have any ice water or alcoholic

How Chickens Get Out of Shells.

Take an egg out of a nest on which a hen has had her full time, carefully holding i to the ear, turning it around, you will find the exact spot which the little fellow is picking on the inside of the shell; this he will do until the inside shell is perforated, and the shell is forced outward as a small scale leaving a hole. Now, if you will take one of the eggs in this condition from under the hen, remoye it to the house or some other suitable place, put it in a box or nest, keeping it warm and moist, as near the temperature of the hen as possible (which may b 68 done by laying it between two bottles o warm water upon some cutton or wool), and lay a glass over the box or nest, then you can sit or stand, as it is most convenient. and witness the tree modus operandi. Now watch the little fellow work his way into the world, and you will be amused and in structed, as I have often been. After he has 68 got his opening he commences a nibbling notion with the point of the upper bill on he outside of the shell, always working to he right (if you have the large end of the egg from you and the hole upward) until he has worked his way almost around, say with one balf an inch in a perfect circle, h then forces the cap or butt end of the shell off, and then has a chance to straighten h eck, thereby locening his legs somewhat and so by their help, forcing the body from

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

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

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
