— The following points should be
watched after installing a breed of fowls:
Early maturity, fertility, no layers, size,
quality of flesh, and hardness at ages.

— It is estimated that one pound of
pressed oil cake equals three pounds of

— The golden wax and the butter or
butter generally are almost solid glass.
They ripen early and are very tender.

— Japanese persimmon can be grown
in tubs, like oranges, and transferred to
the cooler late in the fall for protection
against frost.

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— The average yield of wheat per acre
in 1881 was only 103 bushels, against 133
bushels for 1880. This of itself would
be equivalent to a falling off of
100,000,000 bushels in the total wheat
crop of 1881.

— Canevas and azaleas do not enjoy
the heat suited to begonias and marantas,
as plants that luxuriate in a temperature
of fifty degrees to sixty degrees cannot be
placed alongside of those that prefer
sooty treatment.

— Excessive drinking of water is said
to increase the consumption of fat in the
body. Too watery food should therefore
be avoided, especially in fattening, if we
wish to obtain the most rapid and abundant
formation of flesh and fat.

— If a small piece of sulphur is occa-
sionally thrown upon the fire for smoking,
it will effectively prevent skippers
and bugs from making inroads upon the
bacon; nor will it produce any effect on
its flavor, save on the mere surface or
skin.

— It requires about 5000 young fish to
stock a pond of one acre in extent. Of
fish weighing from one to two pounds
1000 to the acre is a liberal estimate, and
these will require artificial feeding unless
the pond is very rich with food-producing
vegetation.

— The German carp is a domesticated
fish, holding the same relation to other
fish as our domestic fowl do to the
wild birds of the field and forest. It is
altogether different from the wild-meated,
drowsy native fish so well-known to us
as the carp or "sucker."

— Among the most successful farmers
the sulky-breaking ploughs are now be-
ing largely used in place of the ordinary
two-horse plough. With one of them a
man and three horses may easily do the
work of man and four horses with
the common ploughs.

— The "Rural New Yorker" says it is
generally conceded that wheat needs a
mellow surface, with a greater or less de-
gree of compactness underneath. It is a
natural fact that it grows readily on
portions of fields used thoroughly before
sowing as it does on portions where
the ground was not thus hardened.

— The sunae business has been an im-
portant business in Virginia for several
years. Sunae is used for tanning. It
grows spontaneously, and at certain sea-
sons nearly all classes engaged in gathering
from the fields, as it is a nuisance
in some localities. It sells readily at
from \$20 to \$30 per ton, according to
quality.

— The 6000 tea plants transferred from
ex-Commissioner LeDuc's experimental
farm at Sommerville, S. C., to Enterprise,
Fla., are reported to be doing finely.
The colored people of Florida look with
anxious interest on the plants. It is believed
that the soil and climate of Florida are
particularly well suited for the tea plant.

— Cane sugar is twice a half times as
sweet as grape-sugar, and the resemblance
between them is very close. In cooking
the cane sugar may be changed to grape-
sugar, and when fruit is to be cooked the
sugar should be added after the fruit is
done, instead of mixing both fruit and
sugar before placing them on the fire.

— It is always dangerous to a cow
before calving, or immediately afterward,
to give her stimulating food, such as corn
meal and other grain. It is threatening
with milk fever, draw the milk from
the udder, and keep it drawn out
continually. If the bag is hot bathe with
cold water for half an hour at a time,
until repeated.

— A correspondent of the New York
World says: "I do not pretend to say
what causes scaly potatoes, but some of
my neighbors swear that tobacco is
one cause."
