THE statement of the Comptroller of the Currency issued November 1, shows the amount of national bank notes outstanding at date to be \$361 949 358; decrease during the last month, \$128,272; increase since November 1, 1881, \$2 596. 620. The amount of legal tender notes outstanding on and since May 31, 1878. is \$346,681,016; amount on deposit with deem notes of insolvent and liquidating banks and banks retiring circulation under act of June 20, 1874, \$38,081,070 decrease in deposits during the last month, \$368,982; increase in deposits since November 1, 1881, 87,379,074.

THE special agent of the Treasury De partment in New York was apprised last Friday of an attempt to flood that city with counterfeit \$10 Treasury notes, of the series of 1875, letter C, twenty at least, of them having been passed on store-keepers. "It is a poor counterfeit, and only likely to deceive because the note has not been counterfeited before. An attempt has been made to imitate the fibres, but they are so regular that a close observer would not be deceived. The vignette of Webster is poor, the nose and lips being heavy, and the face wearing a surly expression." This counterfeit first appeared in Chicago, two years ago, and part of the plate was engineed in Missouri. The face of the counterfeit is


