The Immigration Bureau of North Care ins have in charge rome improved farms for They are a great ancess. rent to Northern tenant farmers on the folowing conditions which are the usual terms of rent charged in this State:

Ist, GRAIN AND GRASS FARM. -The land owner furnishes land, houses and substance by the acids of alkalies contained pays all taxes and expenses of improving houses, stables and buildings. The towant farmer furnishes horses, tools and labor, and receives TWO THIRDS OF CROPS. The enant farmer is allowed free of reut garden nd wegetable patches. He is also allowed to raise stock, hogs and shickens and receive all proceeds from the sale of them.

2nd, TOBACUU, GRAIN AND GRASS FARMS .- The land-owner furnishes land, houses and pays all taxes and expenses of improving houses, stables and buildings. The tenant farmer furnishes horses, tools and labor, receiving Three-fourths of the tobacco and Two-thirds of the grate crops. The above mentioned farm No L.

3rd. TOBACCO, GRAIN AND GRASS FABMS .- The innd-owner lurnishes land, houses, feed for horses, tools, repairing and sceping in order of tools and pays all taxes. The tenant farmer furnishes all the manual Inbor: receiving One-half of all crops raised. The tenant farmer receives free of rent as in

first mentioned farm No. 1. 4th, COTTON, GRAIN AND TORAC-CO FARMS .-- Rented exactly on same terms as the above Tubacco. Grain and Grass Farm No 3; or if tenant farmer furnishes horses

and tools, he receives Two thirds of the grain and Three-fourits of the cotton.

The actual cost of feeding horrer, of course, varies widely in accord aneo with the locality; near the large cities with high priced posture land, hay, and erain, of course, are much higher than in more remote districts, so that an estimate expressed in figures would not be of any value except for the locality for which it was made. The course of feeding above laid down, is as well adapted as any to the of circumstances of the ordinary farmer. The stable should be well ventilated, cool, not cold; and draughts avoided if novible. The feet of horses, not at work, shou'd be care fully examined every few days, at lesit twice a week. The ordinary diseases of the stable, "thrush" and "scratches," can be prevented in most, I was about to my in all, cases. 
