From Washington: News Notes.

WASHINGTON D. C., April 16, 1888. MR. EDITOR: The news of the serious

illness of ex-Senator Conkling in New York has caused a sensation at the National Capital such as has seldom been equalled, even upon occasions when the sudden Illness or death of prominent officials has been announced, and crowds have continually beseiged the various newspaper and telegraph offices eagerly anticipating such news as to his condition as could be obtained.

The dead-lock in the House of Representatives which commenced on the 4th inst., was at last broke on Thursday. This happy result was accomplished by a united action on the part of the Democratic members, who decided in caucus held on Wednesday evening to vote to postpone further consideration of the direct tax bill until the next session.

To a person who has never visited the House of Representatives during a protracted dead-lock, any newspaper account would convey but a faint idea of the dreariness of the session. For an entire week the recent contest over the tax bill continued with no intermission, save two or three short receases, and during the last 36 hours of the contest no recess was taken, and every member was required to be in constant attendance, and during all this time absolutely nothing was accomplished, the entire time being occupied in voting upon motious to adjourn and other filibustering tactles.

Senator Dayls, of Minnesota, fully sustained his reputation as an orator. In his maiden speech on Wednesday last. He spoke on the bill relating to the admission of Dakota. His arguments were excellent, and his speech was clear and forcible. He showed bimself to be a valuable addition to the Republican majority, and at the close of his remarks most of the Republican Senators warmly congratulated him.

Mr. Davis insisted that for years the great Commonwealth of Dakota has been danied her rights for simply party purposes. ** -- id that the time had arrived when "the question should be stripped of all pretense, evasion and sham, and the rights of the people should be recognized.

Last Wednesday was a memorable day for Georgetown. For many years there has been a bridge from that place to Virginia, but an exhorbitant toll has been charged and this was a constant source of annoyance to the people who were required to frequently cross the bridge. Dura es ing the last year however, the old strueture has been torn down and a new one erected in its place, and on Wednesday was formally opened to the public and de clared forever "free."
