**Senator Repsher on Ballot Reform. We gladly publish the following clipping from the Lehigh Valley Democrat. Last night the democrats of the Senate and House of Representatives met in joint caucus to decide upon a course of political action to be pursued in regard to Ballot Reform and the calling of a Constitutional Convention. Strange to say the democrats, when they first met, were by no means united upon these two great questions. Many speeches and criticisms were made pro and con. At a late hour Senator Repsher of Lehigh County obtained the floor and in a ringing speech reviewed the arguments at length which had been made during the evening, and pointed out in detail the duty of the democratic party on these all-important questions. If it ever again hoped to be crowned with victory in Pennsylvania, he said, that the democratic party did not come out square and flat-footed in favor of a Constitutional Convention. The Senator said, that technically such was the fact, but fellow democrats, do not commit a political crime against the party by assuming that the people are in a humor to be trifled with and that they will search for, and be satisfied with the spun technicalities. The fact is, that our candidates for the several State offices expressly promised it, during the late campaign, whenever they went all over this broad Commonwealth, in every city, borough and hamlet that they visited. But this is not all, Governor Pattison in his inaugural Address repeated what he has so often said during the campaign, that the only way to get real, genuine ballot reform was through a Constitutional Convention. The masses of the people responded Amen! as a Governor that means to keep his promise. The people accepted the pledges of the leaders of the party and as the result shows, trusted them. That is enough for me to compel me to trust the people and as long as we live in the present system and form of Government, no true citizen can consistently hesitate to trust the will of the people. This is a mere outline of the speech which was the leading feature of the evening and ended the debate. A resolution pledging the democrats of both branches of the Legislature to stand firm for a Constitutional Convention and genuine ballot reform was unanimously adopted after the Senator's brilliant speech. Senator Repsher was heartily congratulated by his fellow Senators and the members of the house for his forcible and well-timed remarks.**

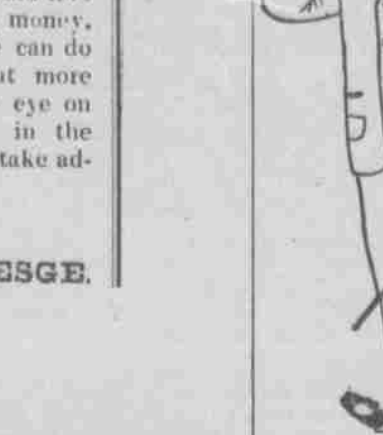
