#### From the Baltimore American. Funeral Obsequies of the late President,

Gen. Zachary Taylor. WASHINGTON, July 12, 1850,

The funeral ceremonies which took place in this city to-day on the occasion of the interment of the late President of the United States, were such as perhaps have never been equalled in this country-at once strikingly touching and solemnly imposing; appropriate alike to the distinguished position, eminent virtues and lofty patriotism of him whom they were designed to honor, and such as became a great nation lamenting one of its most heroic sons.

The appearance of the Federal city was one consonant with the occasion and the ceremonies which were to take place in it. The Capitol, the public buildings, and a a large proportion of the private houses, were draped in the sables of mourning. On Pennsylvania avenue, from the Capitol to the Presidential mansion, we did not notice a single building, no matter how humble, on which some appropriate insignia of mourning were not displayed. In many instances the houses were draped with much appropriate richness and elegance. The national ensign, suitably shrouded, was also displayed from numerous points. At sunrise the day was ushered in by the firing of federal salutes from the Navy Yard and other military stations in the vicinity.

As the morning advanced the multitude of strangers in the city was increased by large and constant accessions from all parts of the surrounding country. From Baltitimore, train after train arrived, crowded to their fullest capacity with those anxious to witness and participate in the ceremonies. Among those who thus arrived were the military of Baltimore, who were received at the depot by detachments of the volunteer corps of the District.

The procession, the chief features of the ceremonies, was, in all its details, imposing and appropriate, and exceeded in extent all that had been anticipated in regard to it. Its length, when in column of march, was full two miles; the military escort alone extending nearly from the foot of the Capitol to the Treasury Department. The military escort excited justly the admiration of all, both from its brilliancy and numerical force, and from the perfect propriety and fitness with which its arrangements and movements were carried out.

At twelve o'clock the tolling of the bells and the firing of minute guns by detachments of United States Artillery, stationed near St. John's Church, the City Hall and the Capitol announced that the hour had arrived when the funeral ceremonies were to commence. The religious services took place in the East Room of the President's House, where the body laid in State, in the presence of the family, the President, the heads of the Departments, members of the Senate and House of Representatives, and of the Foreign Ministers. The services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Pyne, Rector of St. John's Church, who was in attendance on the President during his illness. The opening part of the burial service prescribed by the Protestant Episcopal Church was said, and an appropriate funeral oration delivered by the Rev.

Dr. Butler, of the Episcopal Church. On the conclusion of these services the deceased followed. Next came the PRES IDENT OF THE UNITED STATES and the members of the Cabinet of the late President, with the exception of Mr. CLAY-TON, who remains unwell.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate ame next, succeeded by the Senate of the United States, preceded by the President pro tempore and Secretary.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives, preceded by the Speaker and Clerk, followed.


Next in order came the Chief Justice and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States and its officers.

The ministers of Foreign nations resident at Washington, dressed in the splendid and showy costumes of their respective governments, and accompanied by their Secretaries and attaches, followed, and were succeeded by Gov. THOMAS of Maryland, and his aids, Cols. GITTINGS, CARROLL and DAVIES.

The Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, in a body, with their officers and the officers of the corporation of Baltimore, followed, and then the authorities of of State Governments, Ex-members of Congress, District Judges of the United States, Judges of the Circuit and Criminal Courts of the District of Columbia, with the members of the bar and officers of the Courts, officers of the various public offices of the city, Firemen of the District and Sons of Temperance closed the procession.

The ceremonies at the grave, though brief and simple, were such as to be long remembered by all who witnessed them. Surrounding the vault were grouped the Hon. Senators Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, Lewis Cass, Thos. H. Benton, Sam. Houston, the President and Heads of Departments, and many others, whilst conspicuous among the military present was Gen. Scott and many other distinguished officers of the Army and Navy.

Immediately after the closing of the religious ceremonies the last honors were paid to the brave old warrior by the firing party stationed without the cemetery -three rounds of musketry being fired by the infantry and three by the battery under command of Major Sedgwick. The procession was then dismissed, and at sundown the ceremonies of the day were closed by a federal salute from the battery at the Navy Yard.

### RESOLUTION

#### Relative to an Amendment of the Constitution.

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representative of the Commonwealth of Penneylvania in Gener 10 of the Commonwealth of Penneyleania in General Assembly met, That the Constitution of this Common-wealth be amended in the second section of the fifth ar-ticle, so that it shall read as follows: The Judges of the thele, so that it shart read as tohows: The studges of the Supreme Court, of the several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts of Rocord as are or shall be established by law, shall be elected by the qualified elec-tors of the Commonwealth, in the manner following, to be the commonwealth, be the manner following, to wit : The Judges of the Supreme Court, by the electors of the Commonwealth at large; the President Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be establish by law, by the qualified electors of the respective districts over which they are to preside or act as Judges; and the Associate Judges of the Courts of Common Pleus by the qualified electors of the counties respectively. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall hold their offices for the term of fifteen years, if they shall so long behave themselves well, (subject to the allotment hereinafter provided for, subsequent to the first election;) the Presi dent Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be estab-lished by law, and all other Judges required to be learned in the law, shall hold their offices for the term of ten years, if they shall so long behave themselves well; the Asso-ciate Judges of the Courts of Common Pleas shall hold their offices for the term of five years, if they shall so long behave themselves well; all of whom shall be commis-sloned by the Governor, but for any reasonable cause, which shall not be sufficient grounds of impeachment, the Governor shall remove any of them on the address of two-thirds of each branch of the Legislature. The first clection shall take place at the general election of this Commonwealth next after the adoption of this amend ment, and the commissions of all the Judges who may be then in office shall expire on the first Monday of Decem-ber following, when the terms of the new Judges shall then be elected The persons who shall then be elected Judges of the Supreme Court shall hold their offices as follows: One of them for three years, one for six years, one for nine years, one for twelve years, and one for fifteen years, the term of each to be decided by lot by the said Judges, as soon after the election as convenient, and the result certified by them to the Governor, that the com-missions may be issued in accordance thereto. The Judge whose commission will first expire shall be Chief Justice during his term, and thereafter each Judge whose com-mission shall first expire shall in turn be the Chief Justice mission shall first expire shall in turn be the Chief Justice, and if two or more commissions shall expire on the same day, the Judges holding them shall decide by lot which shall be the Chief Justice. Any vacancies, happening by death, resignation, or otherwise, in any of the said Courts, shall be filled by appointment by the Governor, to con-tinue till the first Monday of December succeeding the next general election. The Judges of the Supreme Court and the Presidents of the several Courts of Common Plens shall at stated times reacting for their courtiered Pleas shall, at stated times, receive for their services an adequate compensation, to be fixed by law, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office; but they shall receive no fees or perquisites of office, nor hold any other office of profit under this Commonwealth, or under the government of the United States, or any other State of this Union. The Judges of the Supreme Court, during their continuance in office, shall reside within this Commonwealth; and the other Judges, during their con-tinuance in office, shall reside within the district or county for which the yewere respectively elected. remains of the President, surrounded by the Pall Bearers, were taken from the East Room, with all appropriate observances, and borne by a file of United States soldiers to the funeral car in waiting at the north gate of the grounds surrounding the President's House. The remains were there received into line with the customary military honors, and the procession forming into line, moved down Pennsylvania Avenue.

The military under command of Major General Scort, formed on the Avenue, north of the Presidential Mansion, the right resting opposite the War Department. It marched in funeral order, breaking from the left with officers in the rear.

Then followed, in the order laid down in the programme, the civic procession, numbering several thousands.

Then came that which was the mournful cause of the whole pageant, and on which, as it passed along the crowded avenue, was concentrated the gaze of all.

The funeral car was drawn by eight white horses, each led by a groom, appropriately attired. The horses were fitly housed in mourning. The car consisted of three raised bases, on the upper part of which rested the corpse, enclosed in a coffin covered with black cloth, trimmed with silver. Over it rose an elegant cenotaph, surmounted by a gilt eagle, deeply craped. The whole car was draped with black, with intermingled black and white rosettes, and tastefully relieved by white silk fringing. The coffin was entirely uncovered. The car had been prepared with much good taste and elegance, and its appearance was highly beautiful and in every respect appropriate.

The pall bearers rode in carriages in front and rear of the funeral car. On either side, and close to the car, marched a file of United States soldiers who had been in the army under the late President, and all of whom had participated in the battles fought by him in the valley of the Rio Grande.

Immediately after the funeral car, led by a groom, and fully accoutred, followed Gen. Taylor's favorite war horse, familiarly known as "Old Whitey." The associations which were brought up by the remembrance of the many important and critical occasions on which this faithful animal had borne the great commander whose remains he now followed, gave to this portion of the pageant an interest and a point which appealed strongly to the feelings of all who witnessed it.
