**DELAYED GRAIN INJURIES.**

I recommended a friend, some time since, to feed his cattle on rotten or refuse corn, which he did, and maintained for a while that it certainly fattened them; but after some time, his steer was paralyzed. It, however, soon recovered upon change of food. I have seen no such effect. I have just killed what we consider good beef, fattened chiefly in that way. A young friend in this county, P. Remarks by the Editors of the American Agriculturist.—There is great danger of feeding to animals, diseased or decayed food of any kind. Some species of decay are not injurious, others are positively dangerous. The rot in the potato of late years, has in many instances not diminished the fattening properties of the roots, as it was the tissues or nitrogenized portions of it that were decayed, while all the starch from which the fat is principally formed, remains unimpaired for some time after the commencement of the rot.

So it is frequently with grain. The starch is little liable to decomposition, or disease, and is only induced to it by the proximity (close juxtaposition) of the albuminous (nitrogenised) parts, which communicate incipient fermentation, which, under favorable circumstances, rapidly proceed to destructive decomposition.

The ill effects of this species of food is shown in the fact quoted by our correspondent above, that a steer fed upon it became paralyzed, and a change was essential to prevent this terminating fatally. We have known a choice herd of swine swept off by feeding on wheat that had been damaged by leakage on ship board. To insure safety under such feeding, a person must know just what he is about, and the precise quality and condition of the article he is feeding.

**TO PLOUGH IN CLOVER, &c.**

Those who have undertaken to plough in green crops, know the difficulty frequently attending the operation, on account of the liability of the plough to be clogged, and the vegetable matter being left uncovered. A correspondent of the American Farmer gives the following description of a contrivance he has adopted, which is stated to answer the purpose completely:—Saw off a block from some hard, durable, and heavy wood; say about ten inches long, and three and a half or four inches in diameter; then take a trace chain, about three feet long, confine one end to the block, by driving a small staple in the end, having first passed the staple through an end link of the chain. Point the other end of the block, and attach a larger chain in the same manner to that. Tie the short chain (attached to the square end of the block,) to the rod which passes through the mould-board and beam of the plough, by wrapping it around the beam at that place; drop the block in the bottom of a furrow which has been already opened, of course on the mould-board side, draw up the long chain, and attach that to the clevis pin or clevis;—be sure that you have both chains just tight enough to permit the block to lie in the furrow; allow no slack. The short chain gathers the clover, weeds, &c., and bends them down; the weight of the plough prevents the chain from rising, and the plough laps the dirt over the weeds, while they are in a recumbent position. I am this day turning under weeds as high as the heads of the ploughmen, who are almost wholly concealed.

**From the Germantown Telegraph. SAVING CLOVER SEED.**

In the January number of the Albany Cultivator, is an inquiry from C. W. Cathcart, respecting the saving of clover seed at the East. I will give you our mode in Litchfield county, Connecticut. At the proper time for securing the crop, we go with our scythes and mow when the dew is on, being careful to stop as soon as the dew is off. In cloudy or foggy weather we mow all day. We let it remain in the swath till it is cured, then rake it into winnows, and roll it into small heaps while it is damp with dew. In the after part of the day, thresh or tread it off from the straw, either on the barn floor or on a bed made in the field for the purpose. If it is threshed in the field, it will be necessary to take up the chaff every night, as it gathers moisture from the ground, which greatly retards the cleaning. We consider it best, when we can, to use the barn floor, and let the seed remain until we finish the field. By keeping the chaff level on the floor, we can work to advantage until the chaff accumulates to the depth of three feet or more.

The greatest difficulty in treading it from the straw with cattle or horses, is the time required to shake the chaff from the straw, so that it will not be thrown out with the straw; but in my opinion it is decidedly best to use even in threshing. In this way a load the size of a ton of hay can be threshed in three or four hours, and three turnings to each floor will make it entirely clean. We then carry the chaff to the mill, where it is cleaned in good order for market, for one dollar per bushel. The machine is manufactured by Harmon Baldwin, Esq., of Washington, Litchfield county, Connecticut, and was put up and set running in this vicinity, for (I think) \$120.—The machine requires but a small power to carry it, probably not an eighth of that required for a run of provender stones.
