And last, though not of least importance, the Ladies are respectfully invited to make and exhibit of their handwork, and the Committee feel assured that the display of all that is useful and ornamental in their line will equal, if not exceed, any other department of the exhibition.

Resolved, That it be again published, that although all persons, whether members of the Society or not, are invited to attend the exhibition as exhibitors, yet that no person who has not signed the Constitution of the Society, and paid over to the Treasurer a sum not less than one dollar, previous to the time of exhibition, shall be entitled to a premium.

The Committee would again urgently request of the citizens of Millin county, who are not already members, to enrol themselves as such without delay; and of those who are members, to exert themselves and persuade their neighbors to become members also.

All exhibitors must be subject to the rules and regulations adopted by the Society.

Two premiums cannot be awarded for the same animal or article, in any case whatever.
