T. E. HAMILTON'S RECIPE .- First premium. To every 100 pounds of pork saltpeter, two pounds brown sugar, one and a half ounce of potash, and four gallons of water. Mix the above and pour the brine over the meat, after it has lain in dried several days before smoking. have generally had the meat rubbed with meat should be perfectly cool before to get it is at packing.

J. GREEN'S RECIPE .- Second premium. To 1,000 pounds of pork take half a hand, can be got to order in thirty-six hours. bushel and half a peck of salt, three pounds of saltpetre, three pounds of sugar, and two quarts of molasses. Mix ; rub the bacon with it well; keep it on for three weeks in all ; at the end of nine days take out the hams, and put those which are at the top, to the bottom.

C. D. SLINGLUFF'S RECIPE .- Fourth premium. To 100 pounds green Hams, take eight pounds G. A. salt, two pounds brown sugar, or molasses equivelent, two ounces saltpetre, two ounces pearl ashes, four gallons water; dissolve well; skimming off the skum arising on the surface. Cloths, Cassimeres, Satinets, &c., Pack the Hams compactly in a tight vessel or cask, rubbing the fleshy part with Goods generally. Of tine salt; in a day or two pour the above pickle over the meat, taking care to keep it covered with pickle. In four to six weeks according to the size and weight of the Hams, (that is to say, the longer period for heavier hams,) hang up to smoke, hock up; smoking with green hickory wood. I have put up my hams for the last twelve or fifteen years by the above recipe with uniform success, equal at all times to the sample now presented.
