The Connecticut Courant, in an article on this subject, says that under the existing circumstances of our party, the first matter of advice is that we should persevere in our exertions. Defeat we have experienced before. Some of our most distinguished victories have been obtained after a series of desheartening defeats. Encouraged by untooked for success, and aided by the feeling that such victories showed that their principles would be perpetual, our opponents have often acted out their real views and lost their supremacy. It will be so now. Some ultra radical measure, some movement, calculated to open the eyes of the more conservative of their party, will mark their progress the coming session of Congress. It has always been so, and will be so again. Men, intoxicated by the supposed success of their measures, can never rest without rushing into some ultraism of imprudence, that will change the current of public opinion.

But there is no necessity of discouragement for the future. In Massachusetts, if the election had been held upon the same principles that it is everywhere out of New England, Mr. Winthrop would have been elected by 20,000 majority. In New York, an even vote in a poll of half a million is no discouraging sign. In Pennsylvania, a vote of one hundred and excitement in trade or politics, while our social seventy thousand is no despicable capital to open shop with another year. In Ohio, the whole vote at the late election, was 30,000 less than in the Presidential compaign of 1844, with an increased number of voters in the State. There is no question where the deficiency fell. Let no one be disheartened. An adherence to our fundamental principles will bring again to our banner our scattered ranks, swelled likewise by the faults and follies of our opponents.

Another duty is to head our divisions, as soon as possible. Every means that honest men can employ should be used to harmonize discordant opinions, to gather together again all scattered friendships, each of which contains a number of seeds, and and to bind the party once more in one brotherhood. Forbearance of disagreement is necessary on both sides. There are points enough for agreement without substance, and that in great abundance dwelling upon minor differences. gings The whole shipment of specie for the fort-night will probably be between two and a half and three millions, including that in the hands of passengers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15, 1851 .- Since my despatches of the 1st instant, we have little of interest to note. Everything remains quiet; no

The arrivals are considerable, while there is no sale for it, a decided preference being given for native hay, of which the crop in California is more than sufficient for her own wants, and has been sold as low as \$15 to \$20 per ton, quality superior.

Our city continues to improve, by the erection of a large number of first-class brick and stone fire-proof buildings in all parts of the city, but more especially on lots recently filled up with sand, extending far out into the Bay—the foundations of which are not of the most solid character, and many of the buildings thus erected (the foundations being laid on plank) have set-tled bodily from one to two feet.

Farmers in the Atlantic States would do well get some seed of our " Burr clover," which is upon them the cattle of our hills eat and grow fat, when to all appearances they are feeding upon a barren waste. Oftentimes the ground is covered to the depth of several inches with the seed, which is very nutritious, being of an oily
