Foreign News.

The steamer Franklin arrived at New York on Tuesday morning, with advices from Havre and Liverpool to the 15th inst. She brings 97 passengers, \$85,000 in specie, and a valuable cargo of French goods.

Much anxiety is felt owing to the nonarrival of the steamship Washington, which When the Franklin sailed she was then in her nineteenth day.

There were brisk sales of cotton; wheat is firm and a moderate supply; flour is unchanged. Accounts of the condition of trade in the provinces are satisfactory. The Manchester market is firm, though in-

The Portuguese war-steamer Porto was lost on the 31st of March, on her passage from Oporto to Lisbon, and all the passengers, thirty-six in number, and all the crew except seven, were drowned.

An extraordinary statement, made by the Captain of a Quebec vessel, to the effeet that in the spring of 1851, he saw two vessels imbedded in the ice, drifting toward Davis's Straits, which are believed to have been Sir John Franklin's ships, has received great attention from the Admiralty. The London Times of the 14th inst. conhowever, puts a damper on the story by showing its impossibility, and suggesting the probability that what the Captain saw, was only the reflection of his own vessel from two different surfaces of icebergs.

On the 9th of January, the ship Kate sailed for London from Australia with 40,274 ounces of gold dust, valued at upwards of £160,000.

Gironde on the 8th inst, with 350 political exiles for Algeria.

PORTUGAL .- Advices from Lisbon to the 31st of March, state that Saldanha and his colleagues had tendered their resignations, in consequence of an adverse vote in the

The Queen refused to accept their resignations, and authorized Saldanha to adopt any measures he thought proper. The Minister, accordingly, adjourned the Chambers until the 20th of May.

The country remained tranquil. On the 9th of April, Messrs. Fox and Chandler arrived at Lisbon, with a memorial from the Society of Friends respecting slavery. The Queen had promised them an audience, and the Government intimated that the slave trade in the Portuguese possessions in Africa, will be gradually abolished.

INDIA AND CHINA .- The overland mail had arrived, with dates from China to Feb. 27th, from Bombay to March 15th, and Calcutta to March 6th.

The expedition against Burmah was to leave Calcutta and Madras on the 19th of March. The force consists of 9000 troops, two ships of war and thirteen steamships. Twenty thousand Burmese troops were assembled at Rangoon, and others were ravaging the frontier villages.

EGYPT .- The difficulties in this country between the Porte and Abbas Pacha have been amicably arranged.

NEW YORK, April 27, 11 P. M. The steamship Northern Light, of the Vanderbilt California Line, arrived about 9 o'clock this evening. She left San Juan at noon, on the 10th instant, and Havana at 6 P. M., on the 23d. Her passenger list includes 300 persons, and she has a small amount of specie.

At 2 o'clock in the morning of the 26th February her Majesty's steamer the Birkenhead was wrecked between two and three miles from the shore of Southern Africa. The exact spot at which the calamity happened was Point Danger. Off this point she struck upon a reef of sunken rocks. The ship was steaming eight and a half knots at the time. The water was smooth and the sky serene, but the speed at which the vessel was passing through the tains three columns of documents on the subject.
