IRELAND .- Desperate Riot in the Cork Workhouse.—A few days ago the master of the Cork Workhouse entered the dining-hall of the house for the purpose of taking possession of a bottle of whiskey which two of the pau-pers, named Houlahan and Corcoran, had smuggled into the premises. The men refused to deliver up the bottle, and one of them struck the master. The police were sent for, whereupon all the able bedied men and boys, and many of the women, rose en masse, demolished everything around them. and attacked the police with the fragments and the stones in the yard. The women were the chief actors in the row, and were so determinately obstinate, that they stood to be rode down by the mounted police. The riot was not quelled until detachments of the 1st Royals, 7th Dragoons, and 90th Infantry had arrived on the spot. Immediately on the withdrawal of the military, the riot commenced anew; and although a strong body of armed police, commanded by two military officers, continued to guard the place, the greatest excitement continued, the paupers being in a state of revolt throughout the following day. Many on both sides have been wounded, and thirty-seven rioters have been lodged in jail.

ROBBERY.

About 10 o'clock on the night of Saturday the 15th May, and after the inmates had retired to rest, six men came to the house occupied by David Johns, Sr., and his son of the same name, about a mile from Davidsville, Somerset county, and demanded admission, saying they wanted something to eat. Mr. Johns refused to admit them, but thinking to get rid of them he handed them some victuals through a window, which they took and retired, but soon returned, as they pretended, for more, and again demanded admission. Upon his refusal they burst in the door and one of the windows, when he knocked down the first two that presented themselves, and was himself knocked down by a third.— During the melee young Johns came with a rifle, but hesitated to shoot for fear of hitting his father, and was almost immediately knocked down himself and his nose broken by a blow with a club. The robbers then bound both father and son, and after cudgelling Mr. Johns, in vain, to make him give up his money, they went to the cellar, where the women had concealed themselves, and compelled them to lead the way to the place where it was kept. In the meantime young Johns had got loose and succeeded in making his escape, which the robbers perceiving, they hastily seized the money, \$430 in gold and silver, and decamped. Some ten or fifteen minutes after their departure, a number of the neighbors had collected, who hastened to the residence of Mr. Isaac Kaufman, in the same neighborhood. Mr. K. told them he was able to protect his own property, but that they should hasten to Johnstown and prevent any suspicious characters from leaving that place in the morning train. morning another party left for Johnstown, and on the way found the track of one Elias Zook of that place, which they knew by a singular distortion of one of his feet. They arrested Zook there, and while in search of James W. Miller another suspicious charac ter, they fell in with Daniel Ewing, whom they caught by means of a dog. Zook and Ewing were lodged in our jail on Tuesday the 18th, when they made a confession in which they implicate Miller and three other persons. Miller was arrested in Pittsburgh and lodged in our jail on Sunday morning last.
