MONEY MATTERS, TRADE, &C.

The total export of coin from the port of New York, since the first of January last, amounts to \$16,755,072. The receipts from California in the same time, exceed twenty-five millions. This looks very well on paper, says the Ledger, but it should be remembered that what California is sending back is but part of a large debt due the Atlantic cities. It is not all clear gains. We should not build too largely upon it. It should also be remembered. that we are all the time sending to Europe a very large amount of bonds, of one sort or another-that these will take annually a goodly proportion of our cotton, corn and pork, to pay the interest accruing on them, and some day or other, perhaps not very distant, a part of them may be sent home for payment of the principal. It is true, many of them do not fall due for some years yet, which relieves the party issuing them from any present concern about them; still they may be thrown on this market for sale, which, so far as the retention of coin in the country is concerned, amounts to the same thing as if due and payable.
