#### Sinking of the Steamer Atlantic on Lake Erie !

ERIE, Pa., Aug. 20.-The steamer Atlantic last night came in collision with the Propeller Ogdensburg, on the Lake, and sunk in about half an hour, with 200 of her passengers.

in getting into port with a portion of the Atlantic's passengers. The steamer Clayton has been despatched from here to the scene of the wreck. The accident occurred during the preva-

lance of a dense fog. At the time of the collision, the passengers

were all in bed. When the steamers struck, the utmost consternation ensued, particularly among the steerage and deck passengers, who were chiefly Norwegian emigrants.— Many of these, in their fright, jumped over-board. The water gained fast, and the fires in the furnaces were soon extinguished. It was quickly apparant that the boat was

rapidly sinking. The scene which followed was terrible— women and children cried for succor from their husbands and fathers, whilst the terror produced by this sudden calamity, deprived the stoutest heart of the presence of mind which was so necessary. The confusion which followed was such that even those who had sufficient self possession, could do but little either in aid of themselves or calm and provided themselves with chairs, settees, beds, &c., and all the patent life pre-servers on board. Many were thus saved who would otherwise have been drowned.— Great numbers of the emigrants jumped overboard and rushed to certain death without making an effort to save themselves,

Amid the wildest shricks of the hundreds of human beings struggling in the water, or fall, clinging to the boat, the noble steamer rapidly settled, and in a few brief moments the dark waters of the Lake closed over her,

The Captain of the Ogdensburg did all in his power to save the lives of those who were struggling in the water, and 200 passengers were picked up, and taken to Erie.

From Mr. Homan, of the Michigan Contral Railroad office, we received information that the following were the number of tickets (emigrants,) 217; deck do., 21; second class do, 10; cabin do., 48; making 326. In ad-dition to this number, Mr. H. thinks there may have been 135 other persons on board including crew, &c., Making altogether about 450. This estimate reduces the probable loss to about 200 souls. Celebration of the Victory at Churubusco.

HARRISEURG, August 20. Our town has been in a constant buzz of excitement the whole day. Early this morning the delegation from Philadelphia arrived, accompanied by Gaul's Brass Band and the Glee Club, and with their music and songs stirred up the enthusiasm of our Whig citizens; and the subsequent arrivals of our delegations were received with cheers and other demonstrations of rejoicing, Among the delegations that arrived were represent atives from the counties of Lancaster, York Perry, Cumberland, Franklin, Huntingdon, Blair, Mifflin, Juniata, and Union. Most of them displayed banners and other tokens of their devotion to the Whig cause, and a determination to elevate Scott and Graham to the highest post within their gift.
