WOOL.

A writer in the Wool Grower, published at Rochester, N. Y., takes the ground, that for the last six years there has been no increase in the production of wool in the world. He

For six years I have taken the utmost pains to make myself thoroughly acquainted with the subject of wool growing over the whole globe. It is but little after all that one can learn, even in that time, so scant everywhere are agricultural statistics. Yet a safe result may be proximated from the little that

is known. There has been no increase in the production of wool during the last six years,nor will there be for so many years to come If we look to Europe, we find that the imports of wool into the great nations of Great Britain, France and Germany, have steadily increased; and we find that in each, wool growing has reached its utmost limit. The imports of wool from Australia for the same time, show but a very moderate increase. From South America and the countries bor-dering upon the Mediterranean there has been increased imports, but they have been more the exhaustion of old stocks than any increase of production in those regions. In the United States there has been a very moderate increase, still nothing to what we had a right to expect from the natural increase of

sheep where properly cared for.'
He says that the demand for wool must be constantly on the increase, and the supply every year getting smaller, until it shall roach such a point, that the price will induce farmers generally to go into sheep growing, which he is satisfied is the most profitable branch of farming that can be gone into in almost every quarter of our great country.

Sowing Grass Seed.

In reply to inquiries made, the Genesee Farmer makes the following remarks on the subject of sowing Timothy. They are the result of much experience, and strike us as being correct and to the point:

For permanent meadow, and on dry land, we should prefer to sow timothy seed in Sep tember, with the wheat, previous to the last dragging. The plant acquires a strong vigorous growth during the fall, and will generally stand the winter, yielding a heavier crop of hav the first season than if sown in the spring, though it sometimes injures the wheat crop on land naturally inclined to

If timothy alone is sown, from half a bushel to a bushel of seed per acre is necessary, according to the soil-clays requiring much more seed than rich, mellow loams. It is sometimes sown alone in August or September, and in this way a good crop of grass is often obtained the following summer.

Except in rare cases, we would never sow on good wheat land, as a rotation crop; for being a cereal, it exhausts the soil of the same elements as wheat, and our wheat oils are not now any too rich, even under the best management. If timothy must be and Tongs, &c. grown, let it be on land not well adapted to wheat; and on such soils it must be sown in the spring, as it is apt to winter-kill on low, alluvial land.


