Report of the Postmaster General.

The Postmaster General's report shows the number of Postoffices in June 30th, 1856, to have been 25,563, being an increase of 4,664 in four years.

The Secretary alludes to the Panama Railroad Company seizing on the occasion of the withdrawal of the steamers via Nicaragua to force the Department to pay what he considers an exorbitant price across the Isthmus.

He alludes to the fact that embracing the branch from New Orleans to Havana there are now four ocean steamship lines running out of New York, at an expense of \$1,498,000 per annum.

Secretary of the Interior's Report. The Secretary of the Interior's Report states the quantity of land surveyed since last report and up to the 3d of September last at 16,853,699 acres, exclusive of school sections.

The quantity of lands sold for cash during the fiscal year was over 9,250,000 acres, and the receipts therefor \$8,821,414.

By the treaties Indian titles have been extinguished to nearly 175,000 acres of land. The aggregate money consideration therefor is \$11,184.

The Secretary of the Navy's Report. The Secretary of the Navy gives a detailed view of the operations of the navy during the last year and its present strength.
