A pair of extra fine Leeves, fed by Marshall B. Hickman, of Chester county, sold at \$12½ the 100 fbs.

Of cows and calves the receipts were also very light, and all offered sold at from \$35 to

50 for fresh cows; £0 00 to 30 00 for springers, and 18 00 to 25 00 for dry cows, as to quality. About 1700 to 25 00 for dry cows, as to quality.

About 1700 hogs and 80 horses were at Singer's Yard this week; the former were all sold at from \$8\frac{3}{4}\$ to 9 the 100 fbs, which is an advance.

Sheep and Lambs—The offerings were light; in all only about 2000, all of which were sold at from \$3½ to 5½ each, and 10@12½c 7 th met, according to condition.

Flour, Grain, &c.

rtour and Meal—The receipts have been very light again this week, but in the absence of any export demand, owing to the obstructed state of the navigation, the market has ruled very dull. The sales of Flour for shipment only reach some 950 bbls in all, at \$6 37½ (6 50 7) bbl for standard and better brands, including 500 bbls, deliverable 1st of March, at the latter rate, and 100 bbls extra at 6 75 bbl; to-day holders are free sellers at 637 bbl for standard shipping brands. Ryd Flour and Corn Meal are very quiet, with a small business doing in the former at \$3.75 (24, as in quality, and 3.00 pbbl for the latter. The inspections for the week ending the 29th inst., are 4,114 bbls Flour, 182 do Corn Meal, and 52 de Rye do.

Grain—The receipts of all kinds centinue very light, but the inquiry for Wheat is limited to the demands of the city millers, who buy only to supply their immediate wants at the present high rates; at the close, however, there is rather more offering, and buyers are holding off for lower prices.
