SNOW SHOE AND LEWISTOWN RAILROAD.—In pursuance of a call regularly made, the friends of this route assembled in the Court House, in Bellefonte, on Wednesday evening, the 28th of January ultimo. The meeting was organized by appointing Gen. James Irvin President, and Col. James Gilliland Secretary, after which Col. Wm. F. Reynolds stated in a clear and succinct manner the object for which the meeting had been called.

Resolved, That the meeting having learned that the Penna. Rail Road Company are willing to furnish engineers to make an experimental survey of a route for a Railroad from Lewistown to Bellefonte, and Snow Shoe; highly approve of the same, and recommend that a subscription of a sufficient sum to defray the necessary expenses of the survey be made by the citizens of Mifflin and Centre counties.

Resolved, That committees be appointed in both counties, to solicit and obtain subscriptions sufficient to accomplish said object. The chair appointed the following persons said committee: Bellefonte—Wm. F. Reynolds, W. T. Milliken, Ira C. Mitchell. Harris Township—Moses Thompson, Geo. Boal, Samuel Gilliland. Potter Township—Wm. Wilson, Jas. Vantrien.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to correspond with the Pennsylvania Rail Road Company, on the subject above referred to, and to report whatever arrangements may be proposed or consented to. In pursuance of which the chair appointed, Dr. Samuel Maclay, Wm. F. Reynolds, and Jno. A. Wright.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in all the papers of Centre and Mifflin counties. On motion adjourned. Every person present being resolved to go to work in the right spirit and open up the wealth of Centre county, by providing an outlet for her iron, coal, lumber and grain.

Singular Suicide.—A lamentable affair occurred near Emigsville, in this county, a short time ago. It seems that a young man had been paying his addresses to a lady whom he desired to marry, but could not gain the consent of his mother. On the day referred to he again asked his mother whether she would consent to the match, but he received a negative reply. He then left her; and when night came on he appeared not at his home. Much anxiety was manifested about his absence.

Horrible.—The Eastern Express learns that a German laborer employed at the Cooper Iron works, met with an appalling death, as follows:—He was engaged in transporting ore in a hand car from a large heap to the stacks, and in loading up was required to run the car under an overhanging mass, which it was supposed was very securely held together by the frost, but a large lump falling from above struck him upon the head and prostrated him upon the car, and before he recovered from the blow the whole mass of ore became detached and fell upon him, killing him instantly. His head was literally torn from his body, which was horribly mangled by the weight of ore.

Dismissed.—Lieut. Charles E. Fleming, U. S. Navy, late the first lieutenant of the brig of war Bainbridge, on the Brazil station, has been dismissed from the service in pursuance of the sentence in his case of the Naval Court Martial recently in session in Philadelphia. Last week, the entire family of Judge Pitzer, of Mt. Vernon, Indiana, consisting of six or eight persons, were poisoned from eating bread containing some poisonous matter, which was mistaken for cream of tartar, by the servant girl who made it. All who partook of the bread were more or less affected by the poison; none, however, fatally.
