

> A Novel License Law .- In the New York Assembly Mr. Hanford has introduced a bill to license the drinkers of intoxicating liquors. It provides that no person shall drink strong liquors without first obtaining a license which may be granted by any Justice of the Peace, on the following terms:

> For a license to drink lager beer, currant or any domestic wines, 50 cents. For strong beer 75 cents

> For whiskey and home made liquors, \$1

For French or any imported brandy, \$1 50.

For Champaign, Burgundy, or any foreign wine, \$5.

No married woman is to obtain a license without the written consent of her husband, Brower Jacob or Samand no minor, without a written consent from his or her guardian.
