The First Chief Justice and the Present. The following letter from the first Chief Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court, has a direct bearing on the recent decision made respecting slavery and the power of Congress over territories, and shows how the fathers of the revolution regarded our institutions.

Dear Sir—I have received the copy of a circular letter, which, as Chairman of the committee appointed by the late public meeting at Trenton, respecting slavery, you were directed to direct to me on the 5th instant.

Little can be added to what has been said and written on the subject of slavery. I concur in the opinion that it ought not to be introduced nor permitted in any of the new States, and that it ought to be gradually diminished and finally abolished in all of them.

Understand the sense and meaning of this clause to be, that the power of the Congress, although competent to prohibit such migration and importation, was not to be exercised with respect to the then existing States, and then only, until the year 1808; but that the Congress were at liberty to make such prohibition as to any new State which might in the future be established.

As to my taking an active part in organizing a plan of co-operation, the state of my health has long been such as not to admit of my wishing to assure the committee of my wishes for their success, and permit me to assure you of the esteem and regard with which I am, dear Sir,
