

the Bellefonte turnpike, on the east side of Laurel run, and follows that side, about 100 feet above the water, along the slope of the mountain, to the end of the 12th mile. The expense of grading the fifth mile is caused by a heavy bank over Deek's hollow, between the first and second mountain, and that of the 16th by a short tunnel through a point of the second mountain where the line turns suddenly into Cox's narrows, between second and Long mountain. The 17th and 18th miles lie along the northern slope of second mountain, which, though very steep, is tolerably regular, and the estimated cost it will be seen is much less than the preceding ones.

line crosses the public road from Boalsburg to Potter's Mills. The 24th mile terminates at the village of Boalsburg, passing close to its eastern border. All these sections, from the 29th, are on good ground; the work will be principally low embankments, with a small portion of rock on the dividing ridge on the 30th mile.

At Boalsburg the line turns northward again in the direction of Bellefonte, and in the residue of its course follows mainly the valley of Spring creek. The grade falls off to 30 feet per mile, except at a few places, where 60 feet has been used to lighten the cuttings through limestone bluffs, as at Irwin's mill on the 30th mile, where the creek is crossed twice, and two heavy bluffs cut thro' to save distance and keep down the maximum curvature to 9° per 100.

4th of July.—The anniversary of our independence passed off quietly here, no public celebration having taken place. The Lutheran Sunday School, over 350 strong, spent the day at a grove near Mr. Riden's; the Presbyterian at Parker's barn; and the Methodist at Granville—both of which latter were numerously attended. They were escorted out of and into town by the new Band, whose members seem to be doing remarkably well for the opportunities they have had for practicing, and who added considerably to the pleasures of the day.

Another warning.—A little boy, a son or grandson of Mr. Womer, residing near the canal, fell into the basin under Marks' warehouse on Monday last, and was rescued from a watery grave by a young man named Davidizer as he was sinking for the last time. Parents and others cannot be too cautious in keeping their children away from the canal and river, as had the above occurred while the hands and others were absent from the mill and warehouse, there would have been no escape from death.

THE BELLEFONTE TURNPIKE. The Bellefonte turnpike leaves Spring creek. At this point we cross Spring creek, and run far to the east along the Centre Furnace road, near the dwellings of Meloyte and Rankin, and come back again to the creek at the end of the 30th mile, near Houser's factory.

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ESTIMATE OF COST. Starting with an elevation of 50 feet above the stream, it requires a grade of 100 feet per mile to reach the top of the ridge just beyond the head of the stream.
