## ARTICLE XI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never ex-ceed seven hundre I and fifty thopsand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so con-tracted, and to no other purpose whatever. SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repal in-vasion, sumpress insurrection, defend the state

sion, suppress insurrection, defend the state war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose indebted.



From section two of the first article of the oustitution, strike out the words, " of the city f Philadelphia, and of each county respectively; from section five, same article, strike out the words, "of Philadelphia and of the several coun ties;" from section seven, same article, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," and insert in lieu thereof the words, and no;" and strike out "section four, same arti

de," and in lien thereof insert the following : "SECTION 4. In the year one thousand eight "Section 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and dis-tributed equally, throughout the state, by dis-

tricts, in proportion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thou sand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a eparate representation; but no more than three ounties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of con-tiguous territory, of equal taxable population near as may be, each of which districts shall ect one representative " At the end of section seven, same article, in-

sert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the fornulation ution thereof." The legislature, at its first session, after the

adoption of this amendment, shall divide the of Philadelphia into senatorial and reprecity sentative districts, in the manner above provi-ded; such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional section to the first article of said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows :

SECTION 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators.
