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RESOLUTION

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments be proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth...

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:— ARTICLE XI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, but the aggregate amount of such debts direct or indirect, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly...

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state...

SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund...

SECTION 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association...

SECTION 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township...

SECTION 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation...

SECTION 8. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:— ARTICLE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one-tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof...

SECTION 9. From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words, "of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively;" and insert in lieu thereof the words, "of Philadelphia and of the several counties;" and in lieu thereof insert the following:—"and no;" and strike out "section four, same article;" and in lieu thereof insert the following:—"SECTION 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in every eighth year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and distributed equally, throughout the state, by districts, in proportion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof...

SECTION 10. The legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

SECTION 11. There shall be an additional section to the first article of said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows:— SECTION 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any charter of incorporation heretofore conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth...

IN SENATE, March 27, 1857. Resolved, That this resolution pass. On the first amendment, yeas 24, nays 7; on the second amendment, yeas 23, nays 8; on the third amendment, yeas 24, nays 4; on the fourth amendment, yeas 23, nays 4.
