Fortunately, the third car jumped so high that it went through the second car above the heads of the passengers. Had it cut through a little lower, several more would have been killed.

From the nature of the accident, and the complete destruction of the cars, it is mirac ulous that out of sixty or seventy passengers, no more were fatally injured. There were sereral narrow escapes of passengers. Mr. Ogsbury, of Jefferson, was in the second car, and the whole woodwork, not one foot above his head, was splintered to atoms.

By her kind and amiable deportment, she endeared herself to those around her, and as a wife, mother and friend, she was the centre of confidence and affection. Her piety was not effervescent, but constant and uniform. She was firm in her attachment to the doctrine and order of the Presbyterian church, and a tended constantly when Providence permitted on all the means of grace. Her health appeared to be gradually declining for a short time before her decease. She was, however, able to attend to her domestic concerns and the house of prayer until nearher last. 
