SHOOTING AFFRAY. The Chambersburg Valley Spirit, of Wednesday, contains probably the most correct report of an unfortunate affray which occurred at Chambersburg last week.

Some years ago, a son of Neville B. Craig, Esq., a distinguished citizen of Pittsburg, married a daughter of Chambers M'Kibbin, Esq., the well-known and highly esteemed proprietor of the Merchants' Hotel, and at present Naval Officer at Philadelphia. Owing to alleged misconduct on the part of Mr. Craig, his wife separated from him, and with their children returned to her father.

About two years ago, Mr. M'Kibbin purchased a farm lying a short distance outside of the corporate limits of this borough, and removed hither with his wife and the younger members of his family, together with Mrs. Craig and her interesting children. Last summer an afflictive event cast its shadow over the household. A gun in the hands of a young son of Mrs. Craig was accidentally discharged, killing instantly a little daughter of the same lady. After this sad affair, the boy, whose distress was unbearably, was taken to Pittsburg by his grandfather Craig, that his mind might be relieved from the dreadful impression made upon it by the tragic scene of which he had, without design, been the leading actor. Yesterday, the poor boy was brought back by his father and sent out to M'Kibbin's. Mr. M'Kibbin, moved by a feeling that does credit to his heart, sent the rest of Mr. Craig's children in to see their father, with whom they spent a happy hour at Jeffrey's Hotel.

Mr. M'Kibbin likewise came to town himself, for the purpose of preventing any difficulties, and induced his sons, whose feelings towards Mr. Craig were known to him, to accompany him out to the farm. They went, but unfortunately learned from the boy who had just returned, that his father had brought him and was then in town. Mr. M'Kibbin nobly exerted himself to calm his excited sons, and after reasoning with them, we are informed, he had cause to believe that his wise counsels would be followed. Contrary to his expectation, however, and when he did not expect it, the young men returned to town.

Mr. Craig, after taking an affectionate leave of his children, whom Mr. M'Kibbin had kindly sent in to see him, proceeded directly to the railroad station, and took his seat in the afternoon train, which was then about to depart. Here his enraged brothers-in-law presented themselves, and fired at him no less than eleven shots, two of which took effect in the lower part of his body, causing severe but perhaps not mortal wounds. Mr. Craig was carried on to Shippensburg, where he now lies.

There were five or six passengers in the cars and a number of persons standing round. Some narrowly escaped being shot, and one or two of the passengers were injured by jumping out of the windows of the cars, to escape the flying balls. Mr. Craig was armed and fired several shots at his assailants.

The young M'Kibbins came to town last evening, and appeared before Justice Reisher, who held them in \$800 each to answer the charge, which was preferred by Constable McLehland. The feeling against them is strong, at the same time that their respected father and all the innocent members of his family, who are weighed down by this unfortunate and terrible affair, have the deep sympathy of the whole community.

SCALPING A WOMAN.

Extraordinary Fortitude.—Some weeks ago, news from Carson Valley was published in our columns, which told of an almost total destruction of an emigrant train by the Indians. A woman, who was one of the train, was scalped and left for dead; and she has since recovered to tell the extraordinary story of her sufferings, and her resolute endurance, which deceived the savages. The Red Bluffs Journal of 16th of September thus tells the tale:

An instance of the most remarkable fortitude and heart-rendering cruelty we ever heard of is related to us by a black man by the name of Scott, who has recently arrived here from Missouri, by the way of the plains. He informs us that a short time before he arrived at Stony Point, on the Humboldt river, the Indians attacked a train of six men and one woman and child. The men were all killed but one who made his escape. The child was also killed and its mother shot in several places with arrows, scalped, and left for dead.

All the while they were scalping her and stripping the clothes from her body, she was perfectly conscious of what they were doing, but feigned death, and let them tear the skin from her head without ever giving signs of life, knowing that if she did, they would either dispatch her at once or take her into hopeless captivity.

At one time when they left her for a moment, she ventured to change her position, in order, if possible, to relieve herself from the uncomfortable position in which she was lying, but on their return they very soon discovered that she had moved, and for fear that her life might not be extinct, they took hold of the arrows that were still sticking in her body, and worked them deeper into the flesh, and stamped upon her with their heels. All this she endured without uttering a groan, or drawing a breath that could be perceived by the savages, and in that condition was left as food for the wolves. Fortunately, however, a train came along before she had lain long in that condition, and dressed her wounds, and brought her along with them, and not the least remarkable fact attending the whole matter is, that she is fast recovering from her wounds; her head, we are told, is nearly well, and the arrow wounds doing better than any one expected.

Hubbs, of Allentown, Pa., says that since May, 1823, he has married fifteen hundred and sixty-three couples. Rev. Mr. Ross, pastor of the M. E. Church of this place, we have been told married 400 couple in one year while stationed at Baltimore.

Philadelphia Cattle Market. The depression noted in the cattle market during the past week has been increased by the pressure of the times and the difficulty of securing currency. The late decline in prices has had a tendency to keep back the receipts, but the supplies are still more than ample for the demand. The offerings comprised about 1100 head, most of which sold from \$8 to 10 @ 100, but fair and those of a very superior quality reaching our highest quotations, and some very inferior at \$7 50. Cows and calves are also very dull, and prices were drooping. About 350 head of the former were offered and partly sold at \$18@20 for dry cows; \$25@30 for springers, and \$45@55 for milk cows.

Sheep and lambs were in good supply and sold from \$2 to 4 50, as in quality. The arrivals at Phillips' Union Drive Yard for the week were 2552 hogs and 60 horses. Hogs sold at from \$7 to 8 50 @ 100 lbs nett. All sold—demand active.

Flour, Grain, &c. A lot of 1750 bags Rio Coffee was disposed of by Messrs. Dutilh, Cook & Co. at \$1 @ 103 cents @ lb, cash and 60 days, establishing a decline of 1/2.

Cloves is wanted, but there is very little coming forward—small sales at \$4 75 @ 64 lbs. Timothy and Flaxseed continue very dull. The Flour market has undergone no change. There is very little export demand. Shipping brands of superfine are held at \$5 25 @ 5 37 1/2 @ lbs. Small sales for home consumption from these rates up to \$7 for common and fancy brands. Nothing doing in Rye Flour and Corn Meal.

Grain—There is not much Wheat offering, and there is but little demand for it. Sales at 126c @ bu for good Southern red, and 120 @ 135c for ordinary and good white. Rye continues in steady request, with further sales of Penna at 75c. Corn is in fair demand, old yellow sold at 71c, put delivered, but some holders refuse this rate. New yellow sold at 56c. Oats are in steady demand at 22 1/2 @ 33c @ bu.
