

LOCAL AFFAIRS.

The water was drawn from the canal few days ago.

The Washingtonians hold meetings nightly in the Town Hall, and are making converts among the right class.

From Monday up to yesterday the weather had the appearance and feeling of that delightful season known as Indian Summer.

A correspondent informs us that an infant child of Mr. Dean of Belleville, was found dead in bed on the morning of the 8th inst.

Christmas will soon be at hand, and although the times are hard and money scarce, yet each one can spare a little to gratify the young. A present is always acceptable, whether a book, an article of jewelry, a dress, or anything else our stores and shops can supply.

The religious meetings held by Rev. Mr. Baker at Yeagertown closed on Monday evening last, having, during their continuance, induced nearly one hundred persons, residents of that neighborhood, to profess faith in the gospel, most of whom have become members of the church. These circumstances are doubly gratifying from the fact that there had been but little union or harmony there for several years, and of course but little religion.

The meetings in the Methodist Church still continue, it being now nearly three months since their commencement.

ACCIDENTS.—Hugh Harkins, one of the hands employed at Freedom Iron Works, had his left hand horribly mangled on Thursday last, while assisting to raise a frame casing, weighing seven or eight tons, by means of levers and blocks, for the purpose of getting it on a wagon. In attempting to move a block his hand was caught by the ponderous weight, and there elapsed only a few present several minutes before the hand was got out. The accident occurred at the feeder near McCoy's warehouse. Dr. Worrall skillfully dressed the lacerated parts, and hopes are entertained that amputation will not be necessary.

On the same day, a son of John Shimp while cutting wood near Granville run, cut his knee badly by slipping and falling on his axe. The wound was dressed by Dr. Stonerod, and is doing well.

BEWARE OF STRANGERS.—It is difficult to believe that in times like the present, there could be scoundrels so destitute of all principle as to attempt to swindle laboring men, but from a circumstance that lately took place up the river, it appears that nothing is too low for some to engage in. A fellow professing to have several hundred acres of land near Tyrone made it extensively known that he was in want of laborers, and by swinging about a bag which he alleged contained a sum of money in gold, succeeded in gaining credence. Stating that he had business eastward, he left his bag with one whom he had engaged to accompany him to his "plantation," and under pretence that he had no small change, borrowed two dollars and fifty cents. The laboring man placed the bag in a chest and desired the "landholder" to take the key along, but he protested he would not, having all faith in his new hand, and accordingly left. Not returning at the time stipulated, some suspicion was awakened, the bag examined, and lo! it contained forty-three bright cents! The fellow speaks both English and German, the former somewhat broken, by which he may be known should he attempt a similar or some other game. Swindlers, pickpockets, thieves, &c. are scattering themselves over the country in all directions—the cities no longer affording room and spoils sufficient—and it will be well for all classes, both male and female, to beware how they make acquaintances with and associates of strangers.

THE MARKETS. LEWISTOWN, Dec. 17, 1857. Butter, good, lb. 16 Eggs, per dozen. 15 Our Millers yesterday were paying for white Wheat 75c@115c; Red Wheat 90c@100; Corn 50; Rye 50; Oats 25. Flour is selling at from \$2 50 to 3 50 per 100 lbs, as in quality. Pork is selling on the street at 5 a 6 cts. Turkeys, chickens and eggs in demand. Philadelphia Cattle Market. Beef Cattle sold at Philadelphia last week at from \$7 to 10. Sheep \$2 1/2 to 4. Hogs \$6 to 6 50. Flour, Grain, &c. There is more demand for cloverseed, and fair and prime quality sold at \$5 25 to 5 37 1/2 @ 64 lbs. In Timothy nothing doing. 400 bushels Ohio flaxseed sold at \$1 35 per bushel. The flour market continues firm, but there is not much inquiry for export. There is a steady inquiry for home consumption from \$5 12 1/2 up to 6 50 for common and fancy brands, as in quality. Nothing doing in rye flour—holders ask 4 25. Corn meal is dull—a small sale of Pennsylvania at \$3 per barrel. Grain.—The supplies of what come forward slowly, and the most of it is of undesirable quality. Small sales of good red at \$1 34 1/2 per bushel; inferior do. at 1 02 and ordinary and good white at 1 12 1/2 to 1 27. Rye is taken on arrival at 75c to 77c in Delaware and Pennsylvania. Corn is in steady demand, and further sales of new yellow were made at 54-57 cents, and a lot of old white at 40 cents; a lot of old in store sold at 68-69 cents. Oats are in better request, and prime Southern sold at 33-35 cents per bushel. A sale of barley malt at \$1.
