The present state of things has been produced gradually since the repeal of the tariff of 1842, for as men do not at once fail in business, neither is the general prosperity of a country destroyed in a day or a year.

THE LATE ELECTIONS .- At the late election in South Carolina, for members of the next Congress, all the present members have been re-elected except Speaker Orr, who declined re-nomination.

The Ohio election has resulted in a republican majority of about 15,000 on the State ticket, and the election to Congress of fifteen republicans and six democrats, a republican gain of three members.

In Indiana, the election seems to have resulted in the choice of the opposition State ticket by from 1000 to 500 majority, and a republican majority in the State Legislature. Three Lecompton democrats and eight opposition members of Congress are elected.

In Iowa, the election has resulted in the choice of Samuel R. Custer, republican, to Congress, by about 1000 majority. He is one of the present members.

COUNTY FAIR .- It is obvious that some better arrangement for holding our annual exhibitions is necessary to insure their success and continuance; and as no time can be better for discussing the subject than the present, we hope all who feel interested in this laudable undertaking will devote some thought and attention to it. The want of a proper enclosure and suitable buildings for the exhibition of fruits, vegetables, fancy articles, and manufactures generally, has been felt since the organization of the society, many of whose active members have repeatedly urged the necessary measures, but without effect. As the most central point, Lewistown or its vicinity would be the most proper location for permanent fixtures, but our hotel keepers and business men have manifested so little interest in securing past exhibitions, every little village in the county having outbid them in inducements, that we fear there is but little hope of their embarking in it. And yet there is no doubt it would pay, and in a few years bring crowds to visit the fair.
