MANY CITIZENS.

Lewistown, March 8, 1860.

Quite a commotion was caused in West Third street one day last week by the arrest of six "ladies" by Constables Mathews and Mathews, charged with drunkenness, disorderly behaviour, and half a dozen other matters not congenial with civilization. They were introduced to Esplanade Weeks, who after an apropos chat with them liberated three on bail, and consigned the others to the care of Sheriff Williams. The whole party will be introduced to the judges, lawyers and jurors at April term, all of whom it is to be hoped will give them a grand reception that will not soon be forgotten.

A WIFE WHIPPED PULLED. James Rager was arrested on Saturday last on complaint of his wife, who charged him with a violent assault and battery on her, striking her with his fist, making threats of murder, and refusing to provide the necessities of life to the wife and children. From her testimony, it appears that Rager came home in the afternoon and demanded something to eat. He was told there was no bread in the house, nor any other food, whereupon the inhuman husband severely reprimanded her for not working or begging bread for him. A few hours afterwards the constable called at his house, and found in Rager's possession the one loaf of bread, to wit, a bottle well filled with tanglefoot. He was then taken to the town institution, and on Monday brought before Justice Hoover for a hearing, who, on examination, committed him six days to a vagrant, and in default of bail for shipping his wife.

The weather has been variable since our last, though not very unpleasant. Heavy rains fell at the close of the week, followed on Saturday night and during Sunday by winds which blew with tremendous force. On Monday it again became warm and pleasant. On Tuesday night more rain fell, and as we go to press it is still cloudy with a raw atmosphere.

Scarlet Fever. Some weeks ago I saw a communication in your paper on the subject of Fever of the Scarletina form. The article seemed to be directed to the people, but I suppose a Physician might have the privilege of reading it.

Now, Mr. Editor, the writer of that article wishes to inculcate some principles in the minds of the people relative to the treatment of said disease. In the first place, he accuses physicians of starting under false ideas in regard to disease, and says that they think, "disease is a something, an entity, like a mad dog in town." Now he rather ignores the idea, and then, before he finishes the article, he contradicts it in these words—"Their bodies got obstructed and their blood inflammatory from bad food, &c." Now he acknowledges that there are some obstructions in the system, which

idea we believe, and moreover we believe that that obstruction must be got clear of before the person can be restored to health. Again, he accuses the physicians for killing more than they cure. Now, my dear friend, that is rather hard language, but perhaps you think you can prove it. If so, just keep these words in view—"The old must die, and the young may die," and see if they do not modify such statements."

Next, as regards the treatment of said disease and drugs used in the same. I am of the opinion, when I look at the list of drugs which the Dr. mentions over, that he knows nothing about drug medication, for where is there a physician that practices medicine who says in treating scarlet fever, he wishes the vital action to leave the surface and settle on the internal organs? None! Let me in conclusion sum up some little experiences in said disease. Out of thirty children taken sick with scarlet fever, five died before a physician could be got; three died of the remainder, and twenty-two recovered. Now does that look as though more die from the treatment than from the disease?
