[From the Housekeeper's Friend.]

As a general rule, it is economical to buy the best articles. The price is, of course, always higher; but good articles spen best. It is a sacrifice of money to buy poor flour, meat, sugar, molasses, butter, cheese, lard, &c., to say nothing of the injurious effect upon the health.

Of West India sugar and molasses, the Santa Cruz and Porto Rico are considered the best. The Havana is seldom clean. White sugar from Brazil is sometimes very good. Refined sugars usually contain most of the saccharine substance; therefore there is probably more economy in using loaf, crushed and granulated sugars, than we should at first suppose.

Rich cheese feels soft under the pressure of the finger. That which is very strong is neither good nor healthy. To keep one that is cut, tie it up in a bag that will not admit flies, and hang it up in a cool dry place. If mould appear on it, wipe it off with a dry cloth.

The small, white sago, called pearl sago, is the best. The large, brown kind has an earthy taste. These articles and tappioca, ground rice, &c., should be kept covered. The best rice is large, and has a clear fresh look. Old rice sometimes has little black insects inside the kernels.

The crackeb cocoi is the best; but that which is put up in pound papers is often very good.

To select nutmegs, prick them with a pin. If they are good, the oil will instantly spread around the puncture.

Keep coffee by itself, as its odor affects other articles. Keep tea in a close chest or canister.

Bread and cake should be kept in a tin box or stone jar.

Cranberries will keep all Winter in a firkin of water in the cellar.

Potatoes should be put into the cellar as soon as they are dug. Lying exposed to the Sun turns them green, and makes them watery. Some good housekeepers have sods laid over barrels of potatoes not in immediate use. to prevent them from sprouting in the Spring, turn them out upon the cellar bottom.

To thaw frozen potatoes, put them in hot water. To thaw frozen apples, put them in cold water. Neither will keep long after being frozen.

Stove Polish .- Make a weak alum water, and mix your British lustre with it; let the stove be cold, and brush it with the mixture; then take a dry brush and lustre, and rub the stove till it is dry. Should any part, before polishing, become so dry as to look gray, moisten it with a wet brush, and proceed as before. By two applications a year it can be kept as bright as a coach body.

Butter Biscuit.-Take two teacups of butter, and rub it well in some dry flour; then add two eggs well beaten, and one quart of sweet milk, with flour enough to make it very stiff dough. Knead it well, and then add to it one half its size of light dough; knead together and let it rise. When light roll it out and cut into round cakes, prick with a fork and bake.

Scouring Knives .- A small clean potatoe, with the ends cut off, is a very convenient medium of applying brick dust to knives, keeping it about the right moisture, while the juice of the potato assists in removing stains from the surface. We can get a better polish by this method than any other we have tried and with less la-

Harmless and sure cure for Warts .-Take two or three cents worth of sal ammoniac, disolved in a gill of soft water, and wet the warts frequently with this solution, and they will disappear in the course of a week or two.

Doughnuts .- Take one quart of light dough, a piece of an egg, and one half teacupful of sugar, knead well together, roll out thin, cut any form you wish, and drop in a pan of boiling lard. Remove them when of a light yellow color.

Cookies .- Five cups of flour, two of sugar, one of butter, one teaspoonful of saleratus, three eggs, and some caraway. Bake

As a general thing, the Commissioners of Mifflin county could not well notice suggestions as to their duty published anonymously. but a communication in the Cazette of the 9th February, signed "A Considerable Taxpayer," calling upon the undersigned for inormation relative to matters in which he alleges they generally have an interest, is per-haps of sufficient importance to merit a reply. The Commissioners have no desire to conceal any part of their expenditures, and here avow their willingness to make explanations, so far as lies in their power, to any one who may call upon them. In many of the suggestions of that communication they see nothing unreasonable, though it would require much labor to give in detail the various items to thinks ought to be published. Others (fox scalps for instance) are paid by the Treasurer on certificates from Justices of the Peace, and are therefore not properly within the jurisdiction of the Commissioners; others are probably so interwoven with general orders as to render a separation extremely difficult. They however subjoin such items as may be of interest, with the remark that so far as the county debt is concerned, no part of it was contracted during the past year.
