Flour.—The market for State and Western Flour is better, but the advance checks the demand; sales at \$5 25a 30 for superfine State; 5 40a 65 for extra do.; 5 25a 30 for superfine Western; 5 40a 65 for extra do.; 5 25a 30 for extra round-hoop Ohio; Southern Flour is quiet, with sales of 900 lbs at \$5 25 a 22 for mixed to good, and 6 20a 75 for extra Canadian Flour is firm, with sales of 450 lbs extra at \$4 40a 47. Grain.—Wheat is 1c higher; sales at \$1 20 a 30 for Milwaukee Club; 1 60 for prime white Michigan; and 1 50 for white Indiana, Corn is 1c better; sales at 62a 63 for Eastern, 64a 65 for shipping, and 62a for yellow. Oats are quiet at 37a 40c for Southern and Jersey, and 40a 42c for Northern and Western. Rye 92c.

Cattle Market, June 4.—Dullness was the chief feature of Cattle market to-day. The offerings were very large, amounting to nearly 2,000 head. The quality of the cattle was generally fair, though there were a number of inferior Beeves brought forward. The greatest proportion of the cattle were from Lancaster and Berks counties. These brought rather high prices, averaging from \$8 to \$10 per 100 lbs. At the close of the market, the tendency for all descriptions was decidedly downward, amounting to a reduction of 25 to 37c. The Sheep market is very dull, and prices have declined. Hogs sold freely. For Cows a slight advance has been obtained.

Centre County. Not long ago, two Jews from Lock Haven, called on Mr. Reinhart, in Pennsylvania, and made a purchase of some six head of cattle. They stated that they were butchers, and owned a large amount of real estate in Lock Haven. They agreed to pay 5 cents a pound for the cattle, making \$275, paying \$70 when they took the cattle away, and the balance in a short time. Mr. Reinhart has since learned that they own no property, are not butchers, and that they sold the cattle for four cents per pound. Upon these facts he made complaint against them for swindling, and on Friday last, Sheriff McCoy arrested them in Lock Haven, and they gave bail for their appearance at Court.
