

# THE HOUSEKEEPER.

**Malone's Mixture for the Cough or cold.**—Take one teaspoon of flaxseed, soak it all night. In the morning put in a kettle two quarts of water, a handful of split up liquorice root, one quarter of a pound of raisins broke in half. Let them boil till the strength is thoroughly extracted, then add the flaxseed, which has been previously soaked. Let all boil half an hour or more, watching and stirring that the mixture may not burn. Then strain, and add lemon juice and sugar to taste. Take any quantity, cold, through the day, and half a tumblerful warm at night. The above is a most excellent receipt.

**Cheep Sponge Cakes.**—Two eggs, 1 tea cup flour, 1 cup sugar, 1 large spoonful sweet milk, 1/2 spoonful soda, 1 tea spoonful cream tartar, a little salt, grated rind of 1 lemon, 1 tea spoonful of butter. Bake fifteen minutes.

**Boiled Suet Pudding.**—One cup of suet finely chopped, 1 of raisins chopped, 1 of milk, 1 of molasses, and a little salt. Stir in wheat flour until it is of the consistency of stirred cake. Boil three hours, serve with sweet cream.

**Omelette.**—Four eggs, 1 teaspoonful of butter cut in bits, 1 large spoonful milk or cream, salt and pepper to taste. Put a piece of butter, half the size of an egg, in the pan—which should not be too large, to allow it to spread too thin—let it melt, break in one slice of bread, crumbled fine, and 2 large spoonfuls of cream. Beat the eggs well, stir them in briskly for a moment, let it cook about five minutes, then fold it over, and turn out. This with ham, makes a nice dish for the breakfast table.

**Yeast.**—To any quantity of water desired, add sufficient hops to make it very strong and let it steep slowly two or three hours. Then boil it a few minutes, strain out the hops, put the liquor back in the kettle, let it boil moderately, add flour until a stiff batter is formed. When thoroughly scalded, put in a jar to cool, and while a little warm, add yeast to ferment it. When well fermented, add two quarts of yeast, a half teaspoon of salt. Keep in a cool place. A tablespoon, twice full will make sponge for a half dozen loaves of bread. Yeast made in this way will not sour.

**Flour Pudding.**—Mix 4 eggs with 4 cups of sweet milk and a tablespoonful of butter, and stir in 2 cups of flour. Bake it 1 of an hour in a quick oven, and serve with sauce of butter and sugar well mixed, with a little wine if desired.

**Tomato Figs.**—Place tomatoes in boiling water and leave them until the skin bursts. Drain off the water, and add sugar enough to cover them, when it is melted. Boil slowly for an hour, skin off the tomatoes carefully, and drain off all the syrup, then pack them in sugar. When dry they closely resemble genuine figs.

## AGRICULTURAL.

**The Decay of American Orchards.**  
Dr. James A. Warder, the eminent Ohio pomologist, writing in a late number of the Cincinnati, upon the decadence of orchards in this country, gives the prominent causes of the failure in the following summary:

"In this essay, I have passed in rapid review, with some occasional simplifications, the chief causes of the premature decay of the apple orchards, which may be attributed to a want of proper selection and preparation of the soil; to want of manures judiciously applied under guidance of analyses that indicate the special manure or plant-food required; to excessive fruitage and early maturity of the trees; to old age; to the effects of grafting and use of bad stocks; to our breeding trees for fruit, rather than for hardiness, vigor and wood growth; to sickly sorts being propagated; to cold and sudden alternations; to disease in the trees and fruit, and lastly, to bad and injudicious pruning."

With all these evils, to which our orchards are so generally subjected, it is not surprising that we should often find them in a state of premature decay, nor that we should hear complaints of their being no longer profitable; but who would expect a crop of corn or wheat to be remunerative under similarly unfavorable circumstances, or when subjected to such bitter neglect? No sensible farmer surely.

Of these thirteen causes of decay, at least nine are simply due to the shiftless management of orchards.
