Then, as to fodder, part of this, of course, should be straw and hay and corustalks; but to expect cows to give much milk on such lean fare is folly. Favor them with messes of chopped roots, of cut straw, or stalks mixed with meal of some kind. A favorite mess for cattle, with a friend of ours is this: Cut up the hay or straw, or stalks, in pieces not more than un inch or an inch and a half long, put the provender in a tub or tight box, and pour boiling water on it, then sprinkle on a little salt, and cover the whole with a little bran to keep the steam in. When cold feed it in messes of a bushel at a time.-Good as this is, it should be varied from time to time, for cows like variety, as well as men. Cows should be salted two or times a week. In mild weather they should range by day in a commodious yard, protected on the sides, at least, by covered sheds. And this yard should have a pen stock of running water, or a trough kept full from a good pump; the first is the best. -Agriculturist.

his posterity.

Break to the Saddle First .- In connec tion with the matter of breaking colts, Herbert says again: 'Greater docility, better subjection to the hand, and, generally, better style and action will be attainable, if the colt be thorougly trained to the saddle before being put to work in harness. Usually, however, in this country, it is very difficult to find a proper person to train a colt in this way; but the same sort of biting should be resorted to as for the preliminary training of the saddle horse.

THE nousekeeded.

Bologna Sausage .- 10 pounds round of beef chopped fine, 21 pounds of the fat of pork, cut in very small pieces with a knife, (not chopped,) 4 ounce of mace, 4 ounce ground cloves, 24 ounces black pepper, bruised in a mortar, not very fine; mix all of these together and let it lay over night. Next day put it into the skins and let it lay four or five days in the sun.

Ormskirk Gingerbread .- Two pounds flour, one pound of butter, one-half pound sifted oatmeal, three-quarters of a pound of moist sugar, one ounce ginger, the same of citron and candied orange peel, all mixed together; then add one pound of treacle. The whole should be mixed the day before it is intended to be baked.

Essence of Lemon .- Cut off, very thin, the rinds of any number of lemons, put the pieces of peel in a phial, and cover them with spirits of wine. After a day or two this will have taken up the oil of the lemon peel, and become far better in quality than usually sold.


