#### The New Tariff Bill.

As the duties laid on iron, steel and iron ore, by the tariff bill which has just passed relation thereto:

IRON, STEEL AND IRON ORE.

1. On bar iron, rolled or hammered, comprising flats, not less than one inch or more than seven inches wide, nor less than onequarter of an inch nor more than two maches thick; rounds, not less than one half an inch or more than four inches in diameter; and squares, not less than one half an inch more than four inches square, fifteen dollars per ton: Provided, That all iron in slabs, blooms, loops, or other forms, less finished than iron in bars, and more advanced than pig iron, except castings, shall be rated as iron in bars, and pay a duty accordingly: And provided further, That none of the above iron shall pay a less rate of duty than twenty percentum ad valorem; on all iron imported in bars for railroads or inclined planes, made to patterns, and fitted to be laid down upon such roads or planes without further manufacture, and not exceeding six i .ches high, twelve dollars per ton; on boiler plate iron, twenty dollars per ton; on iron wire, drawn and finished. not more than onefourth of an inch in diameter, nor less than number sixteen wire gauge, seventy five cents per one hundred pounds, and in addition fif teen per centum ad valorem; over or finer than number twenty five wire gauge, two dollars per one hundred pounds, and in addition fifteen per centum advalorem; on ali oth er descriptions of rolled or hammered iron, not otherwise provided for, twenty dollars

2. On iron in pigs, six dollars per ton; on vessels of east iron, not otherwise provided for, and on sad irons, tailors' and hatters' irons, stoves and stove plates, one cent per pound; on cast iron steam, gas and water pipe, fifty cents per one hundred pounds; on cast iron buts and hinges, two cents per pound; on hollow ware, glazed or tinned, two cents and a half per pound; on all other cast ings of iron, not otherwise provided for. twenty five per centum advalorem.

3. On old scrap iron, six dollars per ton: Provided, That nothing shall be deemed old iron that has not been in actual use, and fit only to be remanufactured.

4. On band and hoop iron, slit rods, (for nails, nuts and horseshoes,) not otherwise provided for, twenty dollars per ton; on cut ils and spikes, one cent per pound; on iron cables or chains, or parts thereof, and anvils, one dollar and twenty five cents per one hun dred pounds; on anchors, or parts thereof, and anvils, one dollar and fifty cents pay one hundred pounds; on wrought board nails, spikes, rivets and bolts two cents per pound; on bed screws and wrought hinges, one cent and a half per pound; on chains, trace chains, halter chains and fence chains, made of wire one dollar and twent; five cents per one huntwo cents per thousand; exceeding sixteen ounces to the thousand, two cents per pound.

. On smooth or polished sheet iron, by whatever name designafed, two cents per pound; on other sheef iron, common or black, ot thinner than number fwenty wire gauge, twenty dollars per ton; thinner than number twenty, and not thinner than number twenty five wire gauge, twenty-five dollars per ton; thinner than number twenty-five wire gauge, thirty dollars per ton; on in plates galvanized, galvanized iron, or iron coated with zinc, two cents per pound; on mill irons and mill cranks of wrought iron and wrought iron for ships, locomotives, locomotive tire, or parts thereof, weighing each twenty-five pounds or more, one cent and a half per pound; on screws, commonly called wood screws, two inches or over in length, five centsper pound; two inches or less than two inches in length, eight cents per pound; or screws washed or plated, and all other screws of iron or any other metal, thirty per centum ad valorem.

6. On all steel in ingots, bars, sheets, or wire, not less than one-fourth of one inch in diameter, and valued at seven cents per pound, or less, one and a half cent per pound; valued at above seven cents per pound, and not above eleven cents per pound, two cents per pound, [and valued at eleven cents per bound, two cents and a half per pound; Provided that no] steel in any form, not otherwise provided for, shall pay a duty of twenty per centum ad valorem; on steel wire less than one-fourth of an inch in diameter, and not less than number sixteen wire gauge, two dollars per one hundred pounds, and in addition thereto fifteen per cent, ad valorem; on cross cut saws eight cents per lineal foot; on mill pitt and drag saws, not over nine inch es wide, twelve and a half cents per lineal foot; on skates costing twenty cents, or less, per pair, six cents per pair; on those costing over twenty cents per pair, thirty per centum ad valorem; on all manufactures of steel, or of which steel shall be a component part, not otherwise provided for, thirty per centum advalorem; provided, That all articles partially manufactured, not otherwise provided for,

shall pay the same rate of duty as if wholly manufactured.

7. On bituminous coal, one dollar per ton of twenty eight bushess eighty pounds to the bushel; on all other could fifty cents per ton of twenty eight bushels, eighty pounds to the bushel; on coke and clum of coat, twenty five per centum ad valorem.

RAILROAD IRON, PARTLY WORN, TO BE FREE OF DUTY.

Railroad iron, partially or wholly worn, may be imported into the United States without payment of duty, under bond, to be with-drawn and exported after the said railroad iron shall have been repaired or remanufactured, and the Secretary of the Treasury is directed to prescribe such rules and regulabe necessary to protect the enue against fraud, and secure the identity, character and weight of all such importations when again withdrawn and exported, restricting and limiting the export and withdrawal to the same port of entry where imported, and also limiting all bonds to a period of time of not more than six months from the date of the importation.

It will now require the action of the various Legislatures of the States, though we believe a far better plan would be to submit the question to the people directly. In this State we believe the proposition would be supported by nine-tenths of the entire vote.
