

THE HOUSEKEEPER.

Corn Meal Muffins.—Scald your meal after sifting, thin it with cold water; to a pint of meal add a full teaspoonful of good lard, salt to the taste; take two eggs, beat the yolks well, add to the corn meal when cool, stir all up well; batter your muffin rings and the bottom of your dripping pan, have the pan quite hot, add as the last thing the white of the eggs beaten to a froth; the batter should be a little thicker than pancakes. Bake quick.

Brown Bread.—One quart rye meal; two quarts Indian meal; two tablespoons of molasses; mix thoroughly with sweet milk; let it stand one hour, then bake in a slow oven.

Rice Cakes.—A correspondent of 'Field Notes' gives the following: While visiting the West India Islands, I became very fond of rice, cooked after this fashion: they boil the rice in the usual manner and let it cool, then add a little water or milk to it, making it about the consistency of common buckwheat cakes. Add to this a little salt and a handful of flour, and bake on a griddle as you would batter cakes and buckwheat. An egg will help some by making them bake quicker. Try it, housekeepers; I think you will find it an excellent dish. Any dyspeptic can eat these rice cakes.

Water Muffins.—Sift one quart of flour, add one teaspoonful of salt, make a batter with tepid water, putting first into the flour two teaspoonsful of cream tartar; when just ready to bake, add one teaspoonful of carbonate of soda dissolved. Bake on a griddle, in rings.

Silver Pie.—Peel and grate one large white potato into a deep plate, add the juice and grated rind of one lemon, the beaten white of one egg, one teaspoon of white sugar, and one teaspoon of cold water; pour this into a pie under crust and bake. When done, have ready the beaten whites of three eggs, half a teaspoon powdered sugar, a few drops of rose water; pour this over the pie and return to the oven to set. When ready for the table lay a few lumps of currant jelly on the top. Have these pies just cold for dinner.

Golden Pie.—Take one lemon, grate the peel, and squeeze the pulp and juice into a bowl—be sure to remove every seed—to which add one teaspoon of white sugar, one teaspoon of new milk, one tablespoonful of powdered starch, and the yolks of three eggs well beaten; pour this mixture into a nice paste crust, and bake slowly. Beat the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth, and when the pie is just done pour it over the top evenly, and return it to the oven just to stiffen, not brown.

Cottage Tea Cake.—Pare some potatoes, boil them, and as soon as done enough to mash, take them out, pour out the water, put in the potatoes, with addition of a little salt, pound speedily, add some flour, and pound in while hot, then turn on your moulding board. Be careful not to have it stiffer than soft biscuit. Put your griddle on the stove greased as for buckwheat cakes, roll out the dough half an inch thick, cut in small squares, bake as buckwheat cakes. As soon as done turn them into a pan, and put on another course to bake. Now split, butter, cover, and so continue till you have them all baked. Take a knife and turn bottom upward, keep them warm that they may be saturated with butter. They are very nice and wholesome. (This is from a Correspondent of the *Rural New Yorker*.)
