The Proposed State of New Virginia.

The proposed State of New Virginia, has a superficial area equal to that of Maryland and Delaware together, and includes thirty-three counties. Their aggregate population is 270,000 whites and 6,000 slaves, which indicates that the manifest destiny of the new Commonwealth would be that of a free State. If carried into operation, the new State will not lack the elements of inherent wealth and prosperity. It is a splendid grain growing region; it abounds in extensive forests of gigantic trees of valuable timber; it embraces the rich Kanawha coal fields, coal oil wells and salt works; it is stored with iron and other minerals; its water powers for driving mills of all kinds are unlimited; it is crossed by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad; it includes the commercial and manufacturing city of Wheeling, and is bounded for two hundred miles on the northwest by the Ohio river. It is, in a word, a fertile region of mountains, covered with great forests, table lands, hills and valleys, and sparkling rivers, capable of sustaining a population of several millions and one of the healthiest regions in the world. As the ball, too, has been put in motion, we predict that it will not stop until New Virginia is a fixed fact, and a new centre of emigration, enterprise and development as pertaining to Old Virginia.

Precautions—Hints to Farmers.

The Legislatures of some of our States have already recommended our farmers to plant this year extraordinary quantities of grain and grass. We hear from various points that this has been and is being done. Nothing should be neglected which will help to make the staple articles of food abundant during the next two years. Our farmers should not only plant large crops of wheat and corn, but they should do well for themselves and for the country to cultivate, to greater than ordinary extent, certain other crops the products of which are largely consumed by soldiers and sailors.

From Fort Pickens.

ARRIVAL OF LIEUT. SLEMMER AT NEW YORK. NEW YORK, May 26.—The steamship Philadelphia has arrived from Fort Pickens, which she left on the 14th, coming home via Tortugas and Key West. She brought Lieutenant Slemmer, Lieutenant Gilman, and the command of the former, with twelve women and children, and twelve mechanics. Everything was quiet at Fort Pickens. The fleet was ready to cooperate with Colonel Brown, the commander of the fort, and were intercepting all the inward bound vessels. The fleet consisted of the Sabine, Brooklyn, Powhatan, and Water Witch, while the Mohawk was at the east end of Santa Rosa Island, to prevent vessels of light draught entering by the eastern channel. Lieutenant Slemmer's company appear much worn, and several have the scurvy, while others are suffering from attacks induced by over exertion and the want of proper food. The same is the case with Lieutenant Gilman, and their appearance makes it evident that a change of locality was necessary for the restoration of the health of all.

THE STAY LAW.

The following is a copy of the bill which has passed both branches of the Legislature, relative to judgments and executions: SEC. 1. Be it enacted, That upon all judgments now remaining unsatisfied, or which may be obtained within six months from the passage of this act, there shall be a stay of execution for one year from the passage thereof, as regards judgments now existing, and from their date as regards judgments obtained after the date thereof. Provided that the defendant is possessed of real estate within the respective county or counties in which such judgments shall have been obtained, or in any other county within this Commonwealth, to which the said judgments shall have been transferred, subject to be sold for the payment of such judgment, worth in the opinion of any court or any judge in vacation, justice, or alderman having jurisdiction of such judgments, at a fair valuation, a sum sufficient to pay or satisfy the same, over and above other incumbrances, and the amount exempted from levy and sale on execution, or said defendant shall give security for the payment of the same, to be approved by the court, or a judge thereof in vacation, or the justice or alderman before whom the same was obtained or may be depending, within sixty days from the date of the judgment, or from the passage of this act, which security shall consist in one or more persons, who shall satisfy the court, judge or justice, by oath or affirmation, and such other evidence as may be required, that they are the bona fide owners of real and personal estate within the county where such judgment shall have been entered, worth at a fair valuation, double the amount of such judgment, over and above all other debts and incumbrances, to which security the plaintiffs may file exceptions as now provided by law. And in all actions now pending, or instituted within twelve months after the passage of this act, in any courts of this Commonwealth, on notes, bills, bonds, or other investments, for the payment of money, or for the recovery of book debts, wherein the defendant or defendants at any state of the proceedings, before sale by the Sheriff, shall have filed an affidavit setting forth that the majority of his or their creditors, whose demands exceed two thirds of his or their entire indebtedness, have agreed in writing to extend the time of payment of the debts due them respectively, the court shall direct the Prothonotary to report the terms of the said extension, upon even evidence submitted to him by the defendant or defendants, and thereupon the court shall enter an order in the cause, that no execution shall issue, except at the period when, and on proportions which it shall appear by the report of the Prothonotary of the majority of the creditors of the defendant or defendants, whose demands exceed two thirds of his or their entire indebtedness, have agreed, as aforesaid, to extend the time of payment of the debts due them respectively, and to no person or firm, bank or broker, holding collateral as security for debts due or to become due, shall within one year from the taking effect of this act sell at public or private sale any such collateral, whether the same consist of mortgages, bonds, notes, or any other security, commercial or otherwise, and any party selling such collateral securities within such time shall become responsible for the same at double the amount for which it was pledged to the owners of such collateral.

The Kentucky House of Representatives have concurred in the Senate bill for reorganizing the militia and appropriating \$1,000,000 for arming the State. The Louisville editors have been summoned to Frankfort to give testimony in regard to arms brought into Kentucky, to matters pertaining to Knights of the Golden Circle, and to the alleged correspondence of Gov. Magoffin with the Confederate authorities. Postmaster General Blair prepared an order on the 24th discontinuing the transmission of the United States mails in Virginia and other seceding states, and annulling all contracts for the same. Tennessee is excepted from the operation of the order for the reason that that State has not formally seceded. This course of the Postmaster General is under the act in relation to the subject passed last session of Congress. Contractors will be immediately notified of this decision. The mails for the South from Washington were stopped at the crossing place by the Federal troops, and were returned to the Post Office at Washington.

The Government on Monday made a simultaneous seizure of all the copies of telegraphic dispatches received and filed at telegraph offices in the Northern cities during the past year. The object is supposed to detect those who have been engaged in furnishing arms and munitions of war to the Seceded States.

The secessionists had stored at Alexandria a large quantity of railroad iron, which was captured by the United States troops. Its value is estimated to be at least \$100,000. It will, of course, be confiscated, and applied to the service of the country they are trying to destroy.

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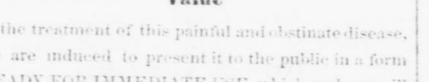
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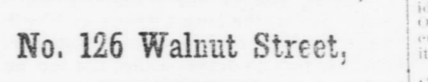
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
