**Power of a Horse's Scent.**—There is one perception that a horse possesses that but little attention has been paid to, and that is the power of scent. With some it is as acute as with the dog, and for the benefit of those who have to drive at night, such as physicians and others, this knowledge is invaluable. I have never known it to fail, and have rode hundreds of miles on dark nights, and in consideration of this power of scent, this is my simple advice: never check your horse at night, but give him a free head, and you may rest assured that he will never get off the road, and will carry you expeditiously and safe. In regard to the power of scent in a horse, I once knew one of a pair that was stolen, and recovered mainly by the track being traced out by his mate, and that after he had been absent six or eight hours.
