LOCAL AFFAIRS

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A young man named Levi Hoover, who will be remembered as in the employ of Samuel Eisenbise for some years, met with a fatal accident on the Northern Central Railroad, late on Saturday last, while attempting to get on the cars near Cockeysville, Md. In attempting to do so, he fell and was caught under the wheels, and both of his legs cut off and his hand crushed. He died a few moments after the accident occurred. His remains were taken to Baltimore, and Dr. Greentree summoned to hold an inquest.

RUNAWAY.—A horse ran away on Monday morning last, somewhere in Valley street, and came down Market at full speed, having upset and somewhat broken a carriage in which Mr. John Kyle was conveying two nieces to town on their way to school. The party, although thrown out, fortunately escaped with a few slight bruises and scratches.

LEG BAIL.—A young fellow named Killmore, recently convicted at Bellefonte and sentenced to the Ho. of Refuge, was brought here last week by the sheriff of Centre county, and locked up in a room in the National House, when the sheriff went down to take a sociable chat with the landlord until car time. In the meantime the prisoner, not liking his quarters, took out the transom above the door, got out, walked down stairs, and in the darkness of the night left for parts unknown.

In his report on the free banking system, we find the annexed remarks relative to the Mifflin County Bank: Before closing this report it may not be improper to state, as the fact will not otherwise officially appear, that the Mifflin County Bank, incorporated by virtue of the provisions of the special act for that purpose, passed

March 26, 1860, has been duly organized, and went into operation in September last. Mortgage on real estate to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars, duly examined, appraised, recorded and certified, have been filed, deposited and recorded in this office, and circulating notes to the same amount, of the denominations of five and ten dollars, have been issued to the bank, registered and countersigned by me, as the law directed.

The propriety of conceding to this bank the privilege, if desired by it, of issuing notes of smaller denominations than five dollars, seems to rest on the same grounds which sustain the policy of granting that privilege to other banking institutions. From the peculiar organization of this bank, it would be necessary for it to retire and return to this office for cancellation an amount of its notes now in circulation equal to the amount of small notes which may be permitted to issue, or the amount of its capital must be increased, and an additional amount of mortgages executed to protect the circulation.

FROM THE LOGANS.—Capt. H. A. Eisenbise, writing to a gentleman at this place, under date of Hancock, Md., Jan. 22, 1862, on behalf of the Logans, says: "Thanks to the ladies of the Volunteer Aid Association of Lewistown, for the kind interest manifested by them in sending each member of the company a pair of cloth mittens, and I assure you the boys received them with every possible feeling and expression of kindness and gratitude.

They came just at the right time to be of service, as we were under marching orders when we received them, and the following day, the snow falling thick and about six inches on the ground, we took up the line of march for Williamsport, where we arrived after two days of the hardest marching we ever experienced. We were there but a short time, and indeed had not got completed the necessary arrangements for our comfort, when we were again ordered to join our brigade at this place, which was another two days' march. We were maimed two days [in town] when we were ordered out to camp, where, however, we could not stay on account of the weather, and were ordered to town, where we are at present in very good quarters, though under orders to be ready for marching at a moment's notice. In short we have been most constantly on the move since we received the mittens, which most plead my excuse with the ladies for the seeming negligence on my part."
