OUR TROOPS.—From what we can gather from letters and other sources, the Logan Guards were, at last accounts, a few miles beyond Harrisonburg, Va.; the Mifflin county Cavalry, Captain Taylor, in the advance at Fredericksburg; Captain Bigelow's in the neighborhood of Port Royal, S. C.; and the 49th with Gen. McClellan on the road to Richmond.

REMARKABLE DEER HUNT.—On Friday morning a week Samuel McDowell, of Armagh township, caught a deer under singular circumstances. While at breakfast the deer appeared in the field near the house, whereupon Mr. McD. immediately gave chase, over the field into the creek, where he caught it by the ears.

Our friend, J. M. Beck of Locke's Mills, informs us there were, during the last winter, four snows in November, five in December, seven in January, eight in February, seven in March, and one in April; making in all twenty-nine, averaging 4 inches each.

A new railroad schedule went into operation on Monday, by which the regular mails from the east are received here early in the morning and about 4 p. m.—The only train eastward by daylight passes here at 10.40 in the forenoon. Our up-river friends are again put to much inconvenience in visiting Lewistown, by limiting their stay here to a few hours, none of the stations having more than one train east, and with the exception of McVeytown but one train west.

The books for receiving subscriptions to the stock of the Valley Railroad will again be opened on the 22d May, when we suppose it will be finally determined whether the road will be made into the valley by the amount subscribed in that region.

The weather for the past week has again been quite cool, with several severe frosts, but up to yesterday the fruit had suffered no perceptible injury. This morning a cold air prevailed, but without frost. In the meantime the grain fields present a fine appearance for an abundant crop.

The body of E. R. Parker, son of Robert Parker, of Wayne township, was brought home a few days ago for interment. He had belonged to the 110th Pennsylvania regiment, and was a member of a Mt. Union company. He died in the hospital at Winchester, aged about 24 years.
