At the late Horticultural meeting in Boston, Col. Wilder, in the chair, there was quite an interesting discussion on fruits .-The chairman made an opening address, in which he said, very truly, that to succeed in the culture of fruit, there must be appropriate soil, a careful selection of harsorts suited to the latitude, and followdy sorts suited to the latitude, and rouow-ed by proper treatment. Some varieties of pears were adapted to a wide range of country, others belonging to a more circumscribed area. He said, however, that the Bartlett succeeded wherever any pear can be raised; and we may add, making it, indeed, all things considered, the pear of the country or the world! In referring to dwarf pears, Col. Wilder said that he had found the Vicar of Wakefield, UHAINS, BRACHIES, Louis Bonne de Jersey, Belle Lucrative, and Urbanist, not to have failed in their crops for thirty years, thus showing hardiness and perfect adaption to a latitude as high as that of Massachusetts. He thought the climate of California surpasses all others for the culture of fruit. In England, some dwarf pear trees, which had been planted forty years, looked as though they might survive forty more. We have upon our own premises such trees about two feet in circumference, transplanted fifteen years ago, when they were at least two years old. now looking as robust as ever, and bearing good crops annually, but some years more abundantly than others. This year all our dwarf trees have been loaded down with bloom, and from the indications of the already swelling fruit, the prospects of a great crop were never more promising. Col. Wilder denounces grafting on suck-

ers as a curse to any orehard. As to apples, he thought with other gentlemen who expressed the same opinion, that the best varieties for general cultivation, were the Baldwin, Rhode Island Greening, Roxburry Russet and Talman's Sweeting. Dr. Loring had found lime employed in combination with pruning, very successful in renovating old orchards or old fruit trees. Orchards, he said, could be readily planted in land which could not be tilled for ordinary farm crops, provided the soil was good, thus saving more even land and securing the same end.

There was one or two points, touching the cultivation of fruit, especially apples, pears and cherries, which we should like to have referred to. These are, 1st, whether all kinds of standard trees could not be grown as low-branched as dwarfs are, and allowed to grow in height not, say over twelve feet, and be as profitable as the larger standards, and whether they would not come into bearing much earlier? 2d, whether such a system would not be a safeguard against the sun by the surrounding branches? Our own humble experience is, that the hot sun acting directly upon the trunks of trees, in the early part of the season, is the main cause of the blight. Dwarfs we believe are never blight-

We have long thought that we permit our fruit trees to grow too tall, exposing the trunk at all seasons injuriously, while the difficulty of gathering the fruit is vastly increased. We should be glad to have the opinion of so experienced and intelligent a man as Col. Wilder, on this subject. The subject of covering raspberry canes

in winter was touched upon at the meeting referred to, and Col. Wilder remarked that he hoped that the simple process of laying down the canes as well as grape vines, upon the surface of the ground, prove ample protection to them from the cold and piercing winds.' As to the canes we do not believe this; but do as to the grape vines, and think it the true plan everywhere for them. Our raspberry canes, not entirely hardy, and none of them are except natives, and some of them not wholly-we prune, lay down and cover slightly with soil, just enough to make them invisible, and they come out splendidly. If they are covered too deeply, they are liable to sprout permaturely, and when exhumed would be subject to injury even from a slight frost. - Germantown Telegraph.

A Good Farm Fence.

Take good straight rails from 15 to 20 feet long, and posts from 6 to 61 feet long, and 5 to 7 inches in diamater. Chestnut is good. After you have heaped up a heap of brush to burn, put the ends of the posts you are going to set in the ground, on the the heap, and then set the brushes on fire, and char the ends of the posts, which will prevent them from rotting so soon, taking SPERMATORRHEA. care not to burn them too much. Then dig the holes from 2 to 21 feet deep and set the posts and wedge them firmly with stones and dirt. The rails of a pannel should be of equal length. Then have one man take hold of each end of a rail, and spike it to the post; 4 rails high is enough.

Three men could build a fence very fast one to dig the holes, the other two to build the fence. A fence built in this way Large Stock of Furniture on is very strong-the rails not liable to be thrown by unruly cattle, takes up very little room and needs no braces--plow close up to each side if you wish, and a very good fence to look at.

Instead of having bars at the entrance of your fields, make a gate in this way :-Take two pieces of joists four inches square, and as high as you wish for the end posts. Then take five strips of inch board for the slats, the lower one being the widest, the next a little narrower, and so on, the top one being the narrowest. Then mortice holes in the end posts, and insert the slats and pin them. Take two strips for braces one on each side. Fasten one end of the brace near the heel of the end post on which the gait is going to swing, and the other end near the top of the opposite post and nail them to the slats .- Country GenUndertaking


